No Plans for Catholic School

Following public consultation meetings on plans for a new non-denominational/Roman Catholic campus in Wemyss Bay Bernard McLeary, Director of Education reported to the Council stating, "It is recognised that there is a demand for denominational education in the area. However, considering the range of variables, including the total number of denominational pupils, numbers attending Inverkip, Wemyss Bay, St Ninian's and other primary schools, roll projections, parental choice and the changed phasing of new housing at the power station site, demand, as currently assessed, is insufficient to establish the need for distinct denominational provision."

Many villagers had objected to the idea of creating a Catholic school, saying that it could stir up religious bigotry in an area where children of all religious persuasions had attended the same primary.

Parish priest and education committee member, Father Tom Boyle had said that the proposed new Roman Catholic school should stand on its own and not share a campus with the existing non-denominational primary..

In his report, Mr McLeary said "There should be a review within five years to establish the extent, nature and location of demand for denominational primary education in Wemyss Bay.

Now it is recommended that the existing Wemyss Bay Primary should be refurbished and extended, and include pre-school education provision. The committee has also been asked approve additional teacher and support staff while improvements are carried out.

At the time of the Village News going to the printer the Council meeting to consider these recommendations was still going on.

Heywood Hotel

The Heywood Hotel in Skelmorlie has been sold to a developer and is set to be converted into 16 luxury flats during the summer, provided planning permission is granted by North Ayrshire Council. Ownership of the hotel, which was built in the 19th century but which is not listed, will pass to a local developer. Harry Monaghan, who has owned the hotel for 16 years said, "My wife and I are really getting to a stage in life where we would like to have more time off. We have declined offers in the past but the time is right to move on. Unfortunately, the offer from a developer far supersedes that to one which is carrying it on as a going concern. It would have been nice to sell it as a hotel but the difference is too great." The hotel currently employs five full time staff and 15 – 20 part-time staff throughout the year. Depending on the planning application the building could be knocked down or converted and refurbished.

Scottish Parliament Round-up by Duncan McNeil MSP

Planning for Transport – Have your Say

In January, the Scottish Executive published national guidance aimed at ensuring that transport considerations are properly taken into account when planning new developments or redevelopments. The new policy, which has now gone out to public consultation, proposes that:

- New developments should be located close to good transport links and parking spaces should be constrained to reduce dependence on car travel;
- New trunk road or motorway junctions will only be considered under exceptional circumstances and will require significant developer funding; and
- Roadside service facilities should be developed for the comfort and safety of drivers with opportunities to stop and rest.

Moves to End Scandal of B&B Accommodation for Kids

At the end of January, Ministers took action to end the use of bed and breakfast accommodation for homeless families with children.

Speaking as the Scottish Executive issued statistics on the numbers of people applying to local authorities for assistance with homelessness, Communities Minister, Margaret Curran, announced:

“The Executive has already made clear to local authorities that we expect them to end the inappropriate use of B&B accommodation for such families.... I now want to seek views on how we use the legislative powers in the Homelessness (Scotland) Act 2003 to ensure it is only in exceptional circumstances and for strictly limited periods that any child should be accommodated in a B&B.”

Education Provision in Inverclyde

As part of a national inspection programme a team from HM Inspectorate of Education assessed the education function of Inverclyde Council between April and June 2001. An inspection team revisited the authority in September 2003 to assess progress made in meeting the recommendations set out in the initial report. The follow-up inspection report was published in January and praises Inverclyde Council in some areas while heavily criticising in others. "Conclusion
Since the inspection report was published in September 2001 the Director and his staff had sustained a good level of improvement in attainment and achievement and had made very good progress in supporting improvement in learning and teaching in its schools. They had put into place some very effective systems to support schools and establishments in becoming more effective. The authority had been successful in developing and implementing a policy to improve educational provision for pupils with special educational needs within an inclusive setting. The Education Service had given a clear lead on Human Rights and Race Equality and had made significant investment in these areas.

The Council had put in place a number of innovative approaches to the use of ICT in educational establishments. It had made good progress in providing effective staff development that enhanced teaching approaches. However, there remained more to be done to meet the targets agreed for the installation of computers and a computer network in all schools and establishments. The lack of funding and the resultant slow progress in meeting these targets had limited the impact of ICT on pupils' learning.

Education Service Officers had demonstrated professional expertise and leadership plans for the improvement of the school estate which had the support of many key stakeholders. However, the new administration's decision to revoke the plans and the inevitable delays had resulted in an unsatisfactory situation. There remained significant weakness in the management of the school estate, in particular the need to address the issue of school rationalisation to ensure Best Value in the use of scarce resources. Alternative plans, and the funding to support them, now needed to be drawn up as a matter of urgency to ensure that all pupils in Inverclyde are able to learn in a suitable school environment.

As a result of the overall fair progress in connection with the rationalisation and improvement of school buildings HMIE will make a further visit to the Council in about a year of the publication of this report. In addition the Council should produce a report in April 2004 showing progress in implementing the National Grid for Learning targets. HMIE will follow-through with the Council on the areas for further development outlined in this report."

The Woodland Association is continuing its work to remove the dreaded rhododendron ponticum from Wemyss Bay Wood. This month they are holding volunteer work sessions on Saturday 7th and Sunday 8th February and again on Saturday 21st and Sunday 22nd February. The Association will provide gloves, tools, tea & coffee. There will be plenty of experienced volunteers on hand to give

advice on what has to be done. Contractors should start path construction and other work towards the end of the month and therefore there is a requirement for certain areas of rhododendrons to be cleared before then. David Cairns MP

One of the most interesting aspects of being the local MP is that you have the opportunity to visit many local businesses etc and meet so many different kinds of people.

A few weeks ago, I visited the local Coastguard station based in Eldon Street, Greenock (now known as the Maritime and Coastguard Agency). This facility covers approximately 2,200 miles of coastline and stretches from the Mull of Galloway all the way up to Mallaig and 1000 miles out into the Atlantic. Last year they dealt with over 700 search and rescue incidents, involving everything from rescuing sailors whose yachts had lost their masts, to helping divers recover from “the bends”. Apparently the coastguard is much busier in the summer months when many small pleasure craft take to the sea. I would have thought that it would be the opposite, what with the rough weather we expect in the winter.

The local coastguard told me about their most memorable rescue effort, where they responded to a distress call from a fishing vessel in trouble in heavy Atlantic seas. The Coastguard helicopter reached the ship just in time to lift the crew off before the vessel sank. Ten people were saved; one had survived after twelve hours in the water. The coastguard winch man received the Queen’s Gallantry Medal for his part in the rescue.

I was very impressed with the energy and professionalism of the Coastguard Rescue Team. Most of the team work full-time, yet they can be called out at any hour of the day or night. They are all highly trained and can search and locate casualties quickly and effectively. The local team not only respond to incidents, they also do routine patrols and offer water and beach safety advice on a wide range of topics to members of the public.

.....And She’s Off!

If you were to ask anyone if they had heard of Lisa Jones, or Carol Williams they would probably reply “No”. Mention Tony McCoy, Frankie Dettori or Keiran Fallon and the response would no doubt be far more positive. All are successful jockeys, though the first mentioned are perhaps still a long way from becoming household names. Female jockeys in the U.K. are few and far between but they are appearing more and more on the racecards and are all hoping to emulate the success of Julie Krone, the most famous American woman jockey, who rode 3,545 winners before she retired in 2000.

Next month 16 year old Heather McGee, a former pupil of Wemyss Bay Primary and Greenock Academy, is off to Newmarket to The British Racing School to try and fulfil her dream of becoming as famous as those mentioned above. She knows that the next few years will be far from glamorous and will involve a great deal of hard work in all weathers and with leisure time. Pre-dawn wake-up calls, lots of hard, physically testing stable work and hours of exercising often highly strung, moody and extremely valuable racehorses over windswept gallops. All this, plus keeping her weight down to under 7 stone, will be the order of the day and there is no guarantee of a place in the Winning Enclosure at a racecourse at the end of it, as competition is fierce.

Heather has recently left Greenock Academy where she was only the second pupil to pursue a Racing Career since 1970. She has been riding since the age of two and has owned a series of ponies and horses since she was ten, so she is well used to early morning starts and all the hard work associated with looking after a horse. She competed regularly in Horse Shows and gained a lot of experience as a groom at events all over the country. Added to this she worked for renowned Renfrewshire trainer Jim Goldie at his Racing Stables in Uplawmoor over the summer holidays. As well as being allowed to ride her first racehorse, initially in an enclosed ring but later over the gallops, Heather was introduced to the wooden training “horse” – a rather basic simulator to help train the correct muscles and practice racing technique.

She decided that this was an excellent way to keep fit so designed and then built her own wooden horse, complete with elasticated neck, which now resides in the family garage.

Heather is now counting the days until she sets off for Newmarket. She has dreamt of becoming a jockey since the age of twelve and now the dream is in the first stages of becoming reality. She is confident that she will succeed though, so much so that her mum has already been told to start looking for a suitably stunning hat to wear at Royal Ascot in a few years' time!
