New Ferry for Wemyss Bay – Rothesay Route

Calmac are having a new ferry built to replace one of the existing ships on the Wemyss Bay – Rothesay route. The order for the vessel will be placed by the end of March, with the new ferry entering service during 2005. The new ship will carry up to 60 cars and 450 seated passengers and will be designed to operate on the existing timetable. The ship will be designed for roll on-roll off operation; however there will also be a side ramp on the starboard side to accommodate the existing pier facilities at Rothesay. Attention has been paid to the facilities for disabled passengers, including a lift between the car deck and the passenger lounge, disabled toilets on the car deck, signs designed for visually impaired passengers and induction loops for those with hearing aids.

Compensation for Phyllis

As a result of a transfusion of contaminated blood following an operation at Irvine Central Hospital in 1979, Wemyss Bay resident Phyllis Macleod contracted Hepatitis C.

Many sufferers do not wish to be identified and Phyllis is one of the very few victims who have campaigned publicly for compensation. Over the past five years Phyllis has travelled back and forth to Edinburgh meeting government and health officials, talking to the media, putting forward the case for all the victims and working tirelessly to force the government to admit that mistakes had been made with blood supplies.

Finally, a few weeks ago, Phyllis was awarded £45,000 following an announcement from Scottish Health Minister, Malcolm Chisholm. The government has decided that it will pay £20,000 to all Hep C victims who have contracted the disease through contaminated transfusions, with a further £25,000 to sufferers in the advanced stages of the illness.

As a result of Hepatitis, Phyllis has a number of other illnesses and has suffered two strokes in the last 6 months, which led to her having to give up editing the Village News. She continues to attend hospital for rehabilitation treatment and, although still having some communication difficulties at times and experiencing severe pain, her condition has improved. Phyllis told me that some people seem to think that the award is excessive. I would ask them – would they like to swap places?

On a positive note, Phyllis is looking forward to her daughter Heather's wedding to Simon at the Priory House Hotel in Largs later this year.

Planning Ahead

Stricter planning guidance is being introduced to avoid more property development in areas at risk from flooding. Under the new policy, published last month, local authorities will be allowed to refuse planning permission on the grounds of flood risk. New developments with a 0.5% or above

probability of being flooded in any year will be considered as medium to high risk for planning purposes.

At the same time, in another positive development for the greenbelt, recently published figures show that more brown-field sites are being used for residential development. While there is still a long way to go, especially in areas like Inverclyde, the amount of vacant and derelict land in Scotland is continuing to fall. And, of the land brought back into use last year, 44% (256 hectares) was used for house-building.

Woodland Association

Most people are now aware that members of the Association are working regularly in the wood to clear rhododendron ponticum. As the ground is cleared of this invasive plant the volunteers are delighted that so many young saplings (in particular beech, birch, ash, rowan, sycamore) are now being given some light and the chance to flourish. In the summer the area is likely to be a riot of colour as foxgloves excel in newly cleared land, however they will really only be around in the first year or two until more native ground and shrub-layer plants are re-established. The Association has also already planted over 1000 bulbs and spring plants this year (last year over 1000 snowdrops were planted and they have already flowered), and more planting will take place in coming weeks. The contract for path construction, essential tree-surgery and other works has been awarded and workers will begin on site this month. In the meantime the Association continues to hold fortnightly Rhodi Bashing Sessions and all willing volunteers will be made most welcome. One of the regular volunteers is 93 year old Maurice Dawson, who has not missed a work day in the last year – he puts many of the others to shame! There are also several 5 – 7 year olds who come along regularly with their parents. No matter your age there are ways in which you can participate and volunteer. In addition to working at weekends, the Woodland Association is hoping to start some weekday sessions and are appealing to anyone who would be available mid-week to put their name on the contact list. David Cairns MP – Energy Transfers

Last month, I had the chance to introduce a Ten-Minute Rule Bill in the House of Commons. This is where an MP puts forward a law of their choice to be debated and voted on. After quite a bit of thought I chose to put before my fellow MP's a Bill designed to compel energy suppliers to compensate consumers who have been the victim of energy mis-selling, known as erroneous transfers. This is where consumers have fallen prey to unscrupulous sales tactics employed by

electricity and gas suppliers. Over the last few years, more and more people have been coming to my surgeries with nightmare stories of how they suddenly find that their gas or electricity suppliers have been changed without warning. Many had no idea how this happened while others recall being called at home and agreeing to be sent some information. However, it appears that some companies were using this request as a green light to go ahead and switch people over without their knowledge. In one particular case, an elderly lady was not receiving any bills at all and two power companies denied all knowledge of her. Months later she was presented with a huge bill for her arrears. Other problems have included the length of time to find out which company is actually supplying the service. Meanwhile, another constituent was receiving two sets of bills from different companies and was threatened with credit blacklisting if they didn't pay up. The consumer watchdog, Energywatch, who I have worked very closely with, is still receiving around 500 complaints every month from worried consumers, who have had their power switched without their consent. I believe that this is just the tip of the iceberg and that the problem is much bigger still. Heavy fines are the only way to deter these power companies from transferring consumers against their will or after heavy-handed door-step selling. Over the last two years we have seen some quite shocking cases which have really traumatised people, especially the elderly and vulnerable. At the present time, companies found guilty of erroneous transfer can be fined by the regulator OFGEM. London Electricity/Virgin were fined a massive £2million and Scottish Power has been fined £200,000 for blocking legitimate transfer requests. However, the fines are paid to the treasury – the consumer gets nothing. But I believe that the victims themselves should receive some degree of compensation. Those who suffer most should benefit most, which is what my Bill would achieve.

An Interest in Brownies or a Way of Life?

Over 40 years ago, local woman, Marilyn McLaughlin joined the Brownies and she hasn't looked back since. Working her way through the Brownies and Guides, she went on to the Sea Rangers (the precursor in this area to the Ranger Guides). As a Sea Ranger, Marilyn learnt to sail and also attended a survival course at Blair Athol where she learnt to live off the land – she assured me that hedgehogs are delicious and taste a bit like chicken but I think I'll stick to Safeway or Tesco!!

After leaving the Rangers, Marilyn continued as a leader and, over twenty years ago, started up the brownies in Wemyss Bay – previously the nearest Brownies or Guides were in Inverkip. Currently over 40 girls attend Wemyss Bay Brownies with a further 30 in the guides.

There are over 11 million members of the Girl Guide movement worldwide with over 70,000 of these in the UK. One in three girls between the ages of 7 and 10 are in the Brownies and every second female in Britain is, or has been, involved at some point in her life.

Moving up in Guiding, Marilyn is now an international trainer, travelling the world to train Guiders. She is also head of self-esteem training for guiders within the UK. With her own limited company, McLaughlin Training Consultancy, Marilyn carries out training on a range of topics for companies throughout the country and is therefore ideally placed to compare the level of training available to

guiders as opposed to that offered by many companies to their employees. Marilyn said, "Guide leaders are all trained to a very high standard, often surpassing the training of many companies. Leaders are trained in Health & Safety, Risk Assessment, First Response (*first aid*), Safe from Harm (*child protection*) and Food Handling & Hygiene. In addition courses on self-esteem, positive leadership and personal development are also available for both girls and leaders." Marilyn estimates that over 50% of her leisure time is devoted to Guiding, which would not be possible without a very supportive, and understanding, family.

Through her role as a trainer in guiding, Marilyn has travelled extensively within the UK and has also visited the Cayman Islands, the Caribbean and Russia. She is looking forward to visiting the Falkland Islands as her great-uncle, the explorer Ernest Shackleton, set off from there on his assault on the South Pole. Whilst in the Cayman Islands, Marilyn met a cousin she didn't even know she had.

Many people think that Guiding is solely a Christian organisation but Marilyn explained, "It is religious in the widest possible sense with girls promising to serve "their" God. Girls from a wide range of religions, including Buddhists, Moslems, Christians and Jews are all involved in the organisation." Locally girls are involved in a variety of outings, outdoor and residential activities and as a result leaders have been trained to prepare, handle and store Kosher and Halal food properly. When necessary, activities are tailor made to suit individual girls and leaders have experience of working with children with special needs.

Like many other organisations, Wemyss Bay Brownies require additional helpers. If there are not enough adults to comply with the required staffing levels then the insurance becomes null and void and children will have to be sent home. Currently they are relying on a rota of parents, but this is not an ideal situation and so they are appealing for more regular help. Even if you would not be able to help out at every session, please consider putting your name forward as it is possible to job share. You will however have to agree to a police check. If you are interested you can get more information by contacting Marilyn Tel: 520615.

By becoming involved you will be developing your own leadership skills while at the same time helping many girls and young women develop their own personal skills. Who knows – maybe there is a 7 or 8 year old out there waiting to broaden their horizons and travel the world, just like Marilyn. Best of all though – it's great fun!!
