## Rory Makes a Splash!

Very well done and congratulations to Rory Kelham, aged 9, who raised a magnificent total of £425 for Macmillan Cancer Relief when he swam 100 lengths of Largs Pool during the recent swimathon held there. This money will go directly towards the local Macmillan appeal, which is currently trying to raise £250,000 to fund a specialist pharmacist and a further Macmillan Nurse to be based within the Inverclyde area. Rory would like to thank Wemyss Bay Primary School and all his teachers for their donations, everyone at his dad's work, and all the friends, family and neighbours who helped him raise so much.

Macmillan Cancer Relief helps people who are living with cancer. In the UK, over a million people are living with cancer and four in ten people will be diagnosed with cancer during their lifetime. These figures are forecast to increase. This means that the demand on services will also increase. So, as well as taking action today to support people with cancer, Macmillan Cancer Relief is shaping the future of cancer care. Their challenge is to ensure that they continue to provide the support that each individual with cancer deserves.

Celebrating its 18<sup>th</sup> year, the swimathon annually attracts 30,000 swimmers and in 2003 alone raised a staggering £1.9m. The range of timed and non-timed challenges meant that there was something for all ages and abilities.

## A Name from the Past

Does anyone remember William Boyd who was the Wemyss Bay Pier-master in the 1940s? Recently his grand-daughter, Margaret Elliot Smith, who stayed with the family in the pierhouse contacted the Wemyss Bay web site. Margaret sent in a number of photographs from the time. Willie Boyd took photos every Sunday and, during the week, these were mailed to son-in-law George Elliott, who was serving with the RAF in the middle east, and also to his son Hugh Boyd, serving with RAMC in France. Hugh was taken prisoner at St. Valerie in 1941, aged 21, and spent 4 years in a POW camp in Poland.

Several pictures show some of Willie's prize-winning displays of flowers and hanging baskets around the station, which were planted up and tended by him. All the plants were started off in the greenhouse behind the Station Master's house. There were two huge tiered displays, several flower boxes and numerous hanging baskets.

In one of the pictures of the station, you can clearly see display cases containing the crests from paddle boxes of early Clyde paddle steamers. Margaret wonders if anyone has any idea of where these crests are now. You can contact Margaret with any information c/o:

## **Advertising Payments**

The Village News is organised through the Community Association for the benefit of the people of Wemyss Bay. It is edited, administered and distributed by volunteers. The mix of adverts changes from month to month. Recently a handful of adverts have been removed on the grounds of late or non-payment. The decision on removal of an advert occurs once an advertiser has accumulated three or more months of arrears and has not responded to reminders. A few advertisers owe almost £100 which considerably affects us since the revenue from advertising is what pays for the costs of printing the Village News and enables us to ensure that every home in Wemyss Bay receives a free copy. Any surplus revenue is used to benefit the Community in the provision of improved Centre facilities and various events during the year. Although we do not intend to name these persistent non-payers in the Village News, as a registered Scottish Charity the Community Association accounts must be available for public scrutiny and debtors will be identified in the accounts. The Association's year-end is 31st March and accounts will appear on the village web site. On the other side we do have many prompt payers and would like to thank those people. Also, some advertisers have opted to pay in advance for a number of months advertising which helps our administration considerably. ## **David Cairns MP – Heroes Return Fund**

In this month's article I would like to inform Wemyss Bay residents about a new Government initiative which could be of interest to some of your older readers. Next year will be the 60th anniversary of the end of World War Two and there will be a number of events to commemorate this important occasion in our history. A new project, The **Heroes Return Fund**, launched a few weeks ago as part of the Veterans Reunited Programme, will provide £10 million of Lottery funding for veterans resident in the UK to travel to the countries in which they served in the Second World War. Speaking to many former servicemen in Greenock and Inverclyde, I know that many would really like to go back to the places where they fought all those years ago, perhaps to pay respects to comrades who didn't return. I am very pleased that we have been able to establish the Heroes Return Fund to mark the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the end of the Second World War, and I believe that the scheme is a fitting tribute to the courage and sacrifice of local veterans.

The scheme will run through until December 2005 and grants are available to fund travel costs for veterans resident in the UK and their carers to visit the countries where they served. Veterans who would like to participate should telephone the Veterans Agency free on 0800 169 2277 for more information and advice.

One final point. It is particularly important for any veterans who want to apply for support to travel to northern France for the commemoration of the Normandy Landings to telephone the Veterans Agency as soon as possible, because they are expecting quite a few applications.

### **Scottish Parliament Round-Up – Duncan McNeil MSP**

#### Tippers Not so Fly Now

I don't need to tell anyone in Wemyss Bay that one of Inverclyde's greatest assets is its striking scenery, and it is infuriating when a number of selfish individuals seek to spoil the landscape for everyone else by strewing their rubbish all over it.

Illegal dumping doesn't just spoil the view, it endangers wildlife and your wallet – according to figures released by Keep Scotland Beautiful, it costs taxpayers £11 million every year.

That is why a new national fly-tipping hotline has been launched, backed by a national information campaign featuring Inverclyde's own Richard Wilson.

Funded by the Scottish Executive, the line provides a single point of contact for anyone who witnesses fly-tipping, or who wishes to inform the authorities of a fly-tipping site which needs cleared.

When caught, serious offenders will be dealt with by the courts. And, when the Antisocial Behaviour Bill becomes law, local authorities, the police and SEPA will have the power to issue fixed penalty fines for less severe offences.

### **Parking Plea**

Customers trying to park at the shops, especially elderly people trying to get to the pharmacy or hairdresser are often unable to find a space. This is a particularly problem when the school is coming in and out and parents are dropping off or collecting their children. The parking area is maintained by the local shopkeepers and is meant for the use of customers and residents in the flats above. If you use the car-park but are not shopping please consider parking in the community centre car-park instead.

The same thing applies to the surgery car-park – it is solely for the use of staff and patients attending for treatment. Often the car-park is full but there are only one or two patients in the surgery at the time. This selfish behaviour could delay a genuinely ill person reaching the doctor.

Finally a number of cars are still parking on the zigzags at the school. This is dangerous and illegal. Obviously these individuals have no consideration whatsoever about the safety of children. Perhaps its time to start taking a note of registration numbers and passing them on to the police?

Due to council cutbacks, Boglestone Library in Port Glasgow and East Library in Greenock are to close and the libraries’ book budget is to be reduced by £76,000. There was also a recommendation from council officials that Inverkip library should close, but this was rejected by councillors. They made the point that the library served an expanding population in Inverkip and Wemyss Bay where access to the main libraries in Port Glasgow, Greenock and Gourock is not so easy.

### **Woodland Association**

Since funding for major works was secured, legal issues relating to ownership and access to a 1m wide strip of land have led to continuing delays in contractors starting work. Final negotiations are now underway, and hopefully work should begin at anytime. (I know, we've been saying this for a while, but every time we thought it was sorted something else came up! This time everything appears to be progressing well and the go-ahead should now come through quickly. Honestly!!) In the meantime volunteers continue their fortnightly rhododendron clearance programme. Anyone interested in joining in will be made very welcome. Gloves, tools and refreshments are provided and there are plenty of other people around to help you get started. Work sessions take place fortnightly on both Saturdays and Sundays from 10am -3pm. You don't have to attend for the full day – even a couple of hours makes a difference. The programme of work sessions for forthcoming weeks are Sat 3<sup>rd</sup> & Sun 4<sup>th</sup> April, Sat 17<sup>th</sup> & Sun 18<sup>th</sup> April and Sat 1<sup>st</sup> and Sun 2<sup>nd</sup> May. The Association also intend starting the occasional mid-week session. If you would be able to help, or if you would like information about any of the work of the Association contact Eila 529375.

In addition to rhodi-bashing, anything between 6 – 15 sacks of rubbish are removed every weekend, and even small people enjoy a bit of wombling! Everyone involved in collecting rubbish are provided with gloves and litter-pickers, even children, who must be supervised and are not allowed to collect glass. Many people assume that rubbish is mainly dropped or left behind by teenagers – nothing could be further from the truth. In addition to bottles, cans, papers, sweet wrappers and poly bags, we have previously removed, amongst other things, a bed-frame, a toilet, chairs, microwaves, car batteries, most of the units from a kitchen and assorted household and garden waste. ### **Lunch Out**

Every Friday Skelmorlie and Wemyss Bay Parish Church hold an open lunch session to which everyone is welcome to attend. Lunch is served from 12.15 – 1.30pm with home-made soup and sandwiches the order of the day. A charge of £2 covers costs, with any profit going in to the church funds. So next time you can't think of what to have, or don't feel like making anything, why not pop along?

### **Recycling**

Greenlight have been recycling waste products since 1991. As a non-profit making company their main objectives involve creating local employment and improving the local environment. They need your help to put recyclable materials into bags and place them on the pavement outside your house on the collection dates. They collect newspaper, magazines, junk mail, catalogues, telephone directories and Yellow Pages but they cannot take envelopes or cardboard. In a separate bag, recycle all food and drinks cans (ideally washed out!) but remember they cannot recycle aerosols or paint cans. You can also help by recycling plastic bottles and carrier bags, as long as they did not contain powerful cleaning products such as bleach. Finally Greenlight will recycle all clean clothing, including shoes, handbags, belts and also teddy bears or other fabric toys – remember that charity shops will also accept quality clothing.

Greenlight collect in this area every second Monday, including bank holidays, with a break only at Christmas time. The next few collection days are Mondays 5<sup>th</sup> & 19<sup>th</sup> April, and 3<sup>rd</sup>, 17<sup>th</sup> & 31<sup>st</sup> May.
