The programme of events starts on Friday evening with a Ceilidh in the main marquee. Dance the night away to popular band "The Midgies". If you haven't been to a ceilidh before don't worry, the band tells you what to do and you will soon be stripping the willow or doing the dashing white sergeant with the best of them. Tickets, priced £5.00 for adults, £3.50 for children with under-5's getting in free, include a buffet supper. Tickets will be available from the middle of this month and can be purchased through any of the centre user groups, in Spar or from Wemyss Bay pharmacy. There are a limited number of tickets, so make sure that you get yours early – they sell out fast! The events on Saturday start at 12 noon when this year's Gala Queen, accompanied by her attendants, will officially open the Gala. There will be a variety of stalls run by local organisations including the Brownies, Mums & Tots and Woodland Association. Once again the youth clubs will be running the tuck shop and the burger stall – last year all the burgers were sold by 1.30pm so, although Liz has ordered even more for this year, you will still have to be quick. In addition to burgers they will also be serving baked potatoes with chilli so if you are looking for a slightly lower fat option this is for you. Ardgowan Football Development will be repeating their popular pie and Bovril stand. The Community Centre will be given over to the Guides tearoom – always a popular attraction with all the lovely home-baking.

Gala Day would not be complete without all the rides for the young and young at heart. This year they will be even bigger and better than before. There will still be the Bouncy Castle, Children's Carousel and the Giant Bouncy Slide for the younger visitors. In addition there will be some aimed at older children, teenagers and adults. Try out your skill and see how long you can last on the Rodeo Bull. Laser Quest is back again this year at popular request and for the first time there is the Bungee Runner – who can make it the furthest along the inflatable run before the bungee rope wins and you slide all the way back to the beginning? Is Dad better than the kids, where does mum come in? This could develop into a competition for the whole family and is sure to provide loads of laughs.

On Saturday night entertainment continues in the main marquee with music and a karaoke special. There is no charge for this and everyone is welcome to come along and have a go. There will be prizes for the best singers and of course a booby prize for the worst. A lot of people think that they would never take part in something like this but it is great fun and after a couple of visits to the beer-tent your inhibitions will slip away and you will be belting out your favourite songs. This year once again, the beer-tent will be providing a wide range of alcoholic and non-alcoholic drinks. Spirits, wine, canned and bottled drinks will appear side by side with a range of beers from Houston Brewery. These were so popular last year at the Ceilidh that an extra delivery had to be made on the Saturday morning and "Helga's Big Jugs" was soon sold out!

The Gala depends on the work of a small group of volunteers for its success. In order to have a fantastic weekend this year help is still needed. Are you artistic? Perhaps you could help out with the face-painting. The Bouncy Castle requires a minimum of two supervisors at all times – can you help out here? Or do you fancy pouring pints – bar staff are required throughout the weekend. Ideally, with enough volunteers, everyone would only have to cover an hour or two and could then have the rest of the time to enjoy themselves at the stalls and rides. ## **Family Traced**

In the December edition of the Village News we told you about American writer Phil Penningroth's search for the descendents of soldiers rescued by his grandfather, Louis, during World War 1. One of the soldiers was a Mr Hyndman of Wemyss Bay.

Following the article we were contacted by Jean Harris, a grand-daughter of Mr Hyndman, who was a gardener on the Castle Wemyss estate until the early 1920s. Jean recently visited Wemyss Bay, along with her mother and Mr Penningroth, to see the woods and terraced garden area where her grandfather once worked. They were also taken, by members of the Woodland Association to the Castle flagpole, the memorial plaque to John Burns, 1<sup>st</sup> Lord Inverclyde and the lodge houses.

## **RNLI Antiques Roadshow**

The recent antiques roadshow held by the RNLI in Seamill Hydro was a great success with several Wemyss Bay residents have an enjoyable and informative day out, while some even had a very pleasant surprise at the valuations placed by experts on their treasures. The event raised £3300 for the RNLI Lifeboats of the Clyde Appeal which aims to raise £1.3million to fund a new all-weather lifeboat to be stationed at Troon. Colin Millar, Coxswain of Troon lifeboat explains, "In the choppy waters of the Clyde, the new boat will reach casualties quicker. It is faster, has the latest technology on board and, in simple terms, it can mean the difference between a life saved and a life lost." The lifeboat (to be named Jim Moffat after a significant donation from a local Ayrshire trust) will be on station this spring, but the RNLI still needs to raise much needed cash to pay for the gap in spending between the amount required and the £1.1million raised so far. It costs the charity £107million to run the lifesaving service, generated from voluntary contributions. The boats are mostly crewed by volunteers who last year rescued 7.365 people from dangerous waters around our coasts. Lifeboats have been saving lives on the Clyde since 1861 and to date have rescued over 5500 people from the estuary waters.

The RNLI currently need new members to join their Inverkip, Wemyss Bay and Skelmorlie branch and help with local fundraising events. As the branch is relatively small this does not constitute a huge commitment – perhaps 4 or 5 events throughout the year. They are however still looking to elect a branch chairman and any volunteers will be welcome! ### **Paws to Give your Thoughts on Animal Welfare Reforms**

They say we are a nation of animal lovers. And if the letters and emails in my in-tray are anything to go by, Greenock and Inverclyde certainly has more than its fair share. I regularly receive representations from constituents arguing that the law needs to better protect pets and livestock from cruel or neglectful treatment. And they're right. Some animal welfare legislation is almost a century old and in serious need of an update.

The Scottish Executive, therefore, has unveiled broad proposals to modernise, strengthen and improve the law relating to animals in the care of humans. These proposals could see, for the first time ever, convictions for keepers who provide inadequate care which may lead to suffering. The Executive is, however, open to suggestions about how exactly this objective is met. And that's where you come in. If you feel strongly on these issues, now is the time to make your views known. If you want anyone owning, managing or keeping animals – including pets – to have a legal duty to properly care for them, let the lawmakers know. The same goes if you want a ban on keeping or training animals for fighting or baiting; or on the uneven shoeing of horses to alter their stance; or on the docking of dogs' tails.

Your views are also sought on whether we should give local authorities statutory powers to remove neglected animals which are suffering, or which are at risk of suffering, to a place of safety. This is a golden opportunity for those of you who are passionate about the issue of animal welfare to see some of the measures for which you have campaigned long and hard finally on the statute books. My advice, as your MSP, is to take it.

## **Unwelcome Wildlife**

Residents of Leapmoor Drive have reported recent sightings of a mink in the area. Mink, which were originally from America, are an unwelcome alien to Britain. They became established after escaping from fur farms over the past few decades. When fur became politically incorrect and the demand dropped, many unscrupulous farmers released animals deliberately rather than have to continue to pay for their upkeep. Invariably associated with water, they have voracious appetites and feed on water birds, fish and small waterside mammals. Where there are large concentrations of mink, many native species of birds are at risk of decline, due to these vicious predators. If you come across mink, it would be better not to feed them, but in any event you should **never** attempt to handle these wild animals as they can be extremely vicious and give a very nasty bite.

Responsibilities include banking receipts around twice per month ten months per year, producing monthly and quarterly invoices for WB News adverts and community centre lets, paying all the Centre's bills, and reporting on the Association's ongoing financial position at the monthly committee meetings.

There are fifty or so monthly advertising invoices, plus a dozen or so quarterly lets invoices, as well as a few monthly regular lets.

The Treasurer also prepares the annual set of accounts for independent review in accordance with the rules applicable to Scottish Charities.

The role would suit anyone with a bookkeeping/accountancy background who has several days per month available to keep the ball rolling.

Finlay has made clear his willingness to continue as mentor to the new incumbent if desired. A basic process manual will be available by the start of the new season, 1<sup>st</sup> September 2004.

The Money Helpline, which provides help for people who have got into debt. Originally started as a voluntary project in the 1980s it was so successful that it was taken under the umbrella of the local council.

### **Recycling**

This month Greenlight will be carrying out their doorstep collections on Mondays 3<sup>rd</sup>, 17<sup>th</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup> May. They still collect, even if it is a bank holiday, so don't forget to put out your old newspapers & magazines, plastic bottles & milk cartons, food & drinks cans, rags and carrier bags. Recycling couldn't be easier – come on and do your bit for the environment.

### **Woodland Association**

The Woodland Association is continuing its programme of rhodi-bashing. As more of the wood is cleared of rhododendron it is encouraging to see so many young plants coming through where previously they had no chance of survival. Young beech, birch, ash, rowan and sycamore are prevalent while a few yews are also trying hard to become established. New volunteers are welcome to join the regular rhodi-bashers with the next few sessions taking place on Sat 1<sup>st</sup> & Sun 2<sup>nd</sup>, Sat 15<sup>th</sup> & Sun 16<sup>th</sup> and Sat 29<sup>th</sup> & Sun 30<sup>th</sup> May. Work starts at 10.00am and continues until 3.00pm with breaks for coffee and lunch. Even if you are only available for a few hours this would help out. The group meets at either the main entrance to the wood at Ardgowan Road or at the Ardgowan Road end of Cliff Terrace Road. Look out for the signs directing you to that day's area of work. Gloves, tools and refreshments are provided.

Did you know that nettles are one of the most valuable plants in a healthy woodland? The nettle supports over 40 species of insect including some of our most colourful butterflies. Often nettle patches are infested by aphids which provide an early food source for ladybirds while blue tits, coal tits and other small woodland birds also enjoy this plentiful source of food. In addition to butterflies nettles also provide a valuable food source for the larvae of many moths such as the Burnished Brass, The Spectacle and the Beautiful Golden Y. Not as showy as their cousins the butterflies, moths can be just as beautiful and often more fascinating. Nettles are good for you: the young shoots can be used in soups and stews in place of spinach, nettle soup and tea are delicious and there is even a nettle cheese. To tie in with Be Nice to Nettles Week and National Moth Night the Woodland Association intends holding a moth and nettle night towards the end of May. The date has yet to be confirmed so look out for posters giving the final details which will appear around the village. We will start off a little before dusk with a look at the uses of nettles today – how to make cloth, the medicinal uses and a couple of easy quizzes. You will also have the opportunity to taste nettle soup. Once dusk approaches we will take a walk into the woods, with an expert guide, to see what moths can be found here in Wemyss Bay. In order to improve our chances of finding a variety of moths we will be putting up moth feeding stations – did you know that they love a mixture of red wine, water and sugar? Bring the family and come along to this unusual event but don't forget to bring a torch and wear sensible shoes or wellies.

On Saturday 5<sup>th</sup> June from 10.00am – 12 noon the Association is holding a Wombling morning to tie in with National Volunteers Week. The aim is to collect all the rubbish which is spoils everyone's enjoyment of the woodland. Gloves, including children's ones, and litter-pickers will be provided and there will be a small prize for every child taking part. Please note that all children must be accompanied by a responsible adult.

Finally the Woodland Association desperately needs to raise some funds to cover the ongoing running costs. In addition to having a stall at the Gala Day where there will be a variety of pocket money toys, either made of wood or having a wildlife connection, they are also launching a "Nature's Nursery Rhyme Quiz". Quiz sheets cost 50pence and all you have to do is fill in the blanks to find nursery rhymes which all include animals, birds, insects or flowers. You can get your quiz sheet from any member of the committee or at the gala day. This is not just a quiz for kids, adults will spend hours puzzling away to find the answers – go on, surprise yourself and see how many nursery rhymes you remember!
