## Mobile Phone Mast

Following a planning application by to site a mobile phone mast within the grounds of the BT exchange in Forbes Place the Community Council were asked to comment. The planning applicants are only required by law to notify anyone with a boundary of less than 4m from the proposed site and therefore very few residents had been notified directly. Instead Wemyss Bay residents were made aware of the issue by a notice from the Community Council placed in Spar and by a petition launched by concerned villagers.

The May meeting of the Community Council was therefore very well attended, with additional seating being brought in to accommodate those present and eventually with standing room only. Councillor Forbes was in attendance and explained that the mast would require full planning permission, however his position as convener of the Planning Committee prevented him from expressing his personal opinion as, to do so, would indicate that he had already come to a decision prior to the committee meeting and he would then be unable to take part in the decision making regarding the application. He was however able to advise that a petition is legally classed as one objection and in order for objections to be considered individually they must all be sent as separate, individual letters. He also explained that the Planning Committee are bound by national legislation which does not permit them to refuse planning permission on the grounds of health concerns – to do so would mean that, in the very likely event of an appeal by the applicant, the previous decision would be overturned on a point of law and they would automatically be granted permission.

Discussion then centred on the mast itself and the possible grounds of objection to it. The mast will take the form of a 15m high monopole with three separate antennae. The proposed site in Forbes Place is in the middle of a residential area, next to an old church where services are conducted on a daily basis. It is also close to the village primary school and immediately adjacent to the church hall which is used by a wide variety of community organisations including Mums and Tots. The impact of such a mast on the devaluation of neighbouring properties is also not classed as a valid planning objection, however people raised the issue of the mast towering over the adjacent properties and impacting on their views of the surrounding

area. Further discussions raised the issues of the possibility of interference with house alarms, interference with television signals and additional traffic on an already very busy road both during the construction and, afterwards, during the long-term operating and maintenance of this sort of structure.

Concerns regarding long term health risks predominated the meeting and, although they are not grounds on their own for turning down an application, the meeting agreed that they should be raised along with other objections nonetheless. Local GP, Dr Chan, said, "Research is still going on into the long term effects of continual low-level radiation and therefore it is impossible to say that there is no risk." He went on to explain that his concern is that this sort of installation may lead to an increase in childhood leukaemia and cancers in the future.

It was agreed at the meeting that while people did not want to stop the progress of mobile technology they do want to see it sited in a more appropriate place away from residential developments.

At the time of writing the period for objections to this application is over. The Planning Committee will consider it at a future meeting, possibly on the 7<sup>th</sup> July although this date can be clarified by contacting the Planning Department at Inverclyde Council nearer the time. Planning Committee meetings are open to anyone to attend, although members of the public are not permitted to speak at these meetings and would be removed from the Council chambers should they interrupt proceedings.

### **Ardgowan Football Development**

As part of this year's Gala Weekend AFD will be holding an Open Day on Sunday 20<sup>th</sup> June. The day will "kick-off" at 11.30am when over 120 children will parade out into the park where the day will be officially opened by a Morton player. They will then demonstrate their skills to their parents and friends, before being presented with their certificates and medals for the 2003/4 season. The presentation will be carried out by the same Morton player, however at the moment we are being kept in suspense as to his identity. Food and refreshments will be available and then two teams from First Touch (Greenock) will play both Ardgowan Thistle Football Club teams in 7-a-side games on the park. Ardgowan Football Development would like to thank all who have helped and sponsored the club over the past year. In particular thanks are extended to all parent helpers and wives for their support and time given – without them such a successful development programme would be impossible.

### **Community Association Seeks Treasurer**

The present treasurer, Finlay McFee, having served in that capacity since December 2000, has indicated that he intends to retire at the forthcoming June AGM.

The Community Association wants to start the process of identifying possible candidate replacements between now and then. The books are now kept on modern software, Intuit's Quickbooks Standard Edition, which includes invoicing capabilities and a fully integrated sales ledger within a full function accounting package.

Responsibilities include banking receipts around twice per month ten months per year, producing monthly and quarterly invoices for WB News adverts and community centre lets, paying all the Centre's bills, and reporting on the Association's ongoing financial position at the monthly committee meetings.

There are fifty or so monthly advertising invoices, plus a dozen or so quarterly lets invoices, as well as a few monthly regular lets.

The Treasurer also prepares the annual set of accounts for independent review in accordance with the rules applicable to Scottish Charities.

The role would suit anyone with a bookkeeping/accountancy background who has several days per month available to keep the ball rolling.

Finlay has made clear his willingness to continue as mentor to the new incumbent if desired. A basic process manual will be available by the start of the new season, 1<sup>st</sup> September 2004.

### **David Cairns MP - The Regeneration of Inverclyde**

Greenock and Inverclyde have many advantages – some fantastic scenery, friendly people who look out for each other, a sense of community and a thriving voluntary sector. But we all know that this part of the world has a challenge on its hands when it comes to our economic base.

We have a larger than average number of people who are long term sick and unable to work, partly a consequence of our former industry of shipbuilding, plus the local economy is very dependent on the electronics industry which certainly fluctuates according to world market conditions. As a consequence we have had a constant stream of pretty gloomy economic news over the last few years.

There is no doubt that Inverclyde needs regenerating. But where will that spur come from? Well, I think there are several positive indicators.

For Greenock, I think the redevelopment of the riverfront would go some way to regenerating the town. At the end of last year I had a meeting with a property development company who were keen to show me their ambitious plans for new housing and leisure developments overlooking the water. They had also been credited with the redevelopment of Manchester's huge Trafford Centre shopping complex and an award winning marina development called Salford Quays. We know that Inverclyde has a problem with depopulation; people are moving out of the area. I believe this kind of development will help to bring about that upward spiral of new investment - new buildings, new jobs, which will make people want to stay here and new people to move here. In fact, if you look at similar areas around the country that are seeking to regenerate themselves, it is often the waterfront that is the spur to the whole area - Docklands in East London, the Albert Dock in Liverpool are two examples.

With that in mind, myself and local MSP Duncan McNeil will shortly be visiting Leith in Edinburgh to see for ourselves how a previously rundown area has now been transformed. And hopefully the long running saga of the redevelopment of Gourrock station will see a new run of prosperity for this seaside town.

## Woodland Association

Unfortunately the planned Moth Night, which we mentioned in the last Village News has had to be cancelled. The usual guide was unavailable and was unable to suggest anyone else with sufficient expertise on moths to conduct a guided walk. Although disappointing, it is hoped to reschedule for later on the year. Plans are underway for a number of other guided walks including a Treasure Hunt and Mini-Beast Safari and details will appear in the Village News nearer the time.

On Saturday 5<sup>th</sup> June, the Woodland Association are holding a "Wombling Morning" from 10.00am – 12 noon. The aim is to clear as much of the litter which is spoiling everyone's enjoyment of the wood as possible. Gloves (including children's) bags and litter-pickers will be provided and there will be a small prize for every child taking part. Please note that children MUST be accompanied by a responsible adult.

Rhodi-bashing is continuing on a fortnightly basis and additional volunteers are always needed. Even if you are only available for an hour or so every second or third weekend that would still help and you are very welcome to come along. All tools, gloves etc are provided. Contact Eila for more details on 529375 or look out for posters. The Association is aware that the amount of rhododendron which has been cut and stacked is beginning to look unsightly. Arrangements are in hand to have all this material chipped as soon as possible.

During the fortnightly work session our volunteers are regularly removing sack loads of rubbish. Certainly some of it is wind-blown, dropped by people having an illicit drink, or sweet, crisp and cigarette packs. People are quick to blame young people but adults are responsible for the majority of the rubbish we remove. The bulk of the rubbish accumulates as a result of fly-tipping. During our last weekend we removed enough rubbish to fill a one-ton builder's sack! Oil cans, laminate flooring, polystyrene, carpet, and assorted other household rubbish was removed from one small area alone. Elsewhere in the wood builder's rubble, including sacks of aggregate and concrete, doors, work surfaces and kitchen units have still to be removed. People are using cars to get to the wood with this rubbish, surely it is not difficult to take it to municipal collection points at Kirn Drive, Pottery Street or Haylie Brae? This is an example of the ignorance, lack of consideration and downright stupidity of people who show no consideration or respect for the safety and enjoyment of other people using the wood. Many people also dump garden waste – this is no better. Plastic sacks, plant pots and other containers take decades to decompose and pollute the surrounding area, while even the dumping of purely organic material causes problems. By getting rid of garden or house plants in the wood you risk introducing species or varieties not native to Scottish woodlands – these can spread and take over, squeezing out our native plants. Fly-tipping of any material is illegal with offenders being dealt with by the courts or with fixed penalty fines. If you see anyone fly-tipping in the wood, or anywhere else in Wemyss Bay, help keep our local area safe for everyone to enjoy by contacting the new National Fly-tipping Stop Line immediately on 08452 30 40 90.

## Councillor Eric Forbes

### Proposed Mobile Phone Mast

As probably the most up to date topic is the mobile phone mast, the following comments are relevant.

National Planning and Policy Guidelines do not permit Local Planning Authorities to take into consideration the question of health issues in coming to their decision. The only grounds available for consideration to the members of the Committee are "siting" and "design." The health issue is very personal and passionate but is really a no go area. The Planning Officers are preparing a report with their recommendations and this will come before the Committee to make a decision."

### Quad bikes

I have had complaints about youngsters and in some cases very young people driving quad bikes around the area of the Community Centre and village streets. This is an illegal practice. It is also a dangerous one not only for the pedestrians who are subjected to speeding machines but also to the riders who expose themselves to accident. Parents have to take responsibility as well for this behaviour and make sure that no one is exposed to danger. The police are aware of these goings on.

### Leven Road Trees

A report is being prepared for submission to the Procurator Fiscal for his consideration. Also a notice is being prepared and will be served on the owners of the land to comply with the conditions of the Tree Preservation Orders i.e. to replace the trees which have been felled.

### Wemyss Bay Railway Station

A few weeks ago some concern was expressed about the state of the station. I contacted SPTA and Network Rail and they both informed me that they had no immediate or indeed future plans to carry out maintenance. However Councillor Alistair Watson, Chairman of SPTA, paid a call to the station to have a look prior to any celebrations of the station's 100th anniversary and he was quite disgusted at the state of the place and is going to actively seek some action being taken to tidy it up.

### Pedestrian Crossing at Pier

The latest news is that a PUFFIN crossing (Pedestrian User Friendly Intelligent Crossing) will be installed at the pier. The crossing and all associated works will be implemented by August 2004.

### South Lodge

It appears that a planning application is coming forward to convert this building to flats.

### Better Sports Facilities for Wemyss Bay?

Ardgowan Football Development and Wemyss Bay Community Association are jointly staging a meeting on Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> June at 3.00pm in the Community Centre to try and bring together other community groups who would like to be involved in fighting for better sports facilities in the area.

Current facilities within the village are far from adequate. As many people are aware the playing field behind the community centre turns into a mud bath after a couple of heavy showers, while the school blaze pitch also frequently becomes flooded. Indeed AFD have had to cancel many training sessions due to inclement weather and the resultant flooding.

Both AFD and the Community Association have already had discussions about how things could be improved. There is a need for facilities, not just for football, but also for basketball, tennis, hockey, bowls or any other outdoor sport. The ideal option would seem to be some sort of all-weather surface behind the community centre to accommodate the needs of the community as a whole.

If you are involved in a group, or would like to set one up, but have no place to go, and would like to join forces to put forward an application to the authorities for improved facilities, then please come along to the meeting. As with any attempt to win over the authorities, it is vital to show a high level of community support.

Obviously any serious attempt to improve things will depend heavily on the finances available. It is unrealistic to expect that Inverclyde Council will be able to come up with the funds required, although we would hope for a contribution. We have already started investigating the availability of other funding sources. AFD's constitution is set up in such a way that they are able to encourage and bring on sports other than football, while the Community Association's constitution is to pursue activities for the benefit of the community of Wemyss Bay. The more organisations there are involved in fighting for improved facilities, the greater our voice and the higher the chance of success.

## Scottish Parliament Report – Duncan McNeil MSP

Many of you, I am sure, will remember, back in the good old days, Wemyss Bay at the Glasgow Fair and the massed hordes pouring off the trains and sweeping along that magnificent wooden concourse, as they made their way through the station, down to the ferry and thence "doon the watter".

Sadly, as I mentioned in my *Telegraph* column the other week, to say that the station's Edwardian grandeur has since faded is putting it mildly.

The toilets, as those of you who use it regularly know, are a disgrace; the paint is cracked and peeling; and plants are growing out the walls – despite the money we invested in refurbishments.

I have, therefore, recently met with representatives of Strathclyde Passenger Transport and Caledonian MacBrayne, who are also concerned at this disrepair, to discuss the way forward.

Wemyss Bay offers visitors from across the west of Scotland the chance to see first class scenery, get a taste of island life and sample some local hospitality – without a 250-odd mile car journey up North.

Staying with transport, it has been confirmed that the pedestrian crossing (no less than a new-style PUFFIN crossing, I am informed) at the monument in the village centre is going ahead. While most will welcome this move, I know that issues relating to parking at the shops remain. These will only be addressed by speaking to and working with all the various bodies about the problems in the pier and station area. Work on this, as they say, goes on....

## **“Save our Skelmorlie” Campaign**

The latest in a series of meetings of concerned Skelmorlie residents took place recently in Skelmorlie Community Centre. Concerns centre on the proposed developments along Shore Road which will see the Heywood Hotel and Chasely House (Beechwood Nursery) being demolished to make way for more flats. There are fears that, in addition to changing the nature of the village and the appearance of the shore front, the additional cars, on an already very busy road, will increase the risk of accidents to pedestrians and other road users.

Plans for the Heywood Hotel site are for 16 flats over 4 floors with over 30 car-parking spaces. The new building, although generally following the existing foot-print of the hotel, will be slightly larger resulting in it being closer to adjacent properties.

Proposals for Chasely House, which includes Beechwood Nursery, will see the current buildings being demolished in favour of 36 flats starting at 4 storeys and being tiered back from the road ending in a 5 storey building. There will be 72 car-parking spaces. With no established building line along Shore Road plans for the new development suggest that construction will be significantly closer to the existing pavement, while the new building as a whole will dwarf the neighbouring Strathclyde House. Neither of these developments are aimed at bringing families into the village and, with a declining birth rate, campaigners are also concerned about the long-term future of Skelmorlie Primary School. The flats are likely to appeal to commuters and, in the main, to retired people and the meeting also raised concerns about the effects of an increase in the numbers of elderly people on an already stretched local GP service.

The committee decisions, ratified at the meeting, include continued opposition to current developments and campaigning to prevent any future developments. They also intend lobbying local North Ayrshire councillors, MSPs & MPs and seeking meetings with the relevant officials of North Ayrshire Council.
