## Community Spirit Alive and Well in Wemyss Bay

On 1<sup>st</sup> September Wemyss Bay Community Association held an emergency meeting in an effort to fill all its vacant committee places. As a Scottish charity and therefore governed by charity laws, they would be unable to continue to function without a full committee. This would place the future of the Community Centre in jeopardy and would result in the Village News being wound up and future Galas and Christmas lights social evenings being cancelled.

At the emergency meeting the outgoing committee were delighted at an attendance of over 60 local people determined to keep things going. Kirsty Donnelly chaired the meeting and was able to report that in the run-up to the meeting two people had come forward to express an interest in the post of Treasurer with someone volunteering only that afternoon to take on the duties of Secretary.

The chair was handed to Ian Dyer of Inverclyde Council to conduct the formal business of electing the officers and the committee. Kirsty Donnelly and Ian Buchan were returned to the posts of Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson respectively, with Kirsty also continuing as Letting Secretary. Elaine Blue was elected as Secretary with Stephen McFeeley taking over as Treasurer.

The four directly elected committee members are Ann Marie Cockburn (Gala Co-ordinator), Pamela Noble (Assistant Treasurer), Finlay McFee (changes in charity's laws and regulations), and Jenny Eaton (Gala Queen Organiser). The committee also includes a representative from each user group and the meeting approved the representatives from AFD, the Brownies, Bible Club, Guides, Nursery Parents, 14-19 club, Woodland Association, P4-P7 club, Village News, Sunday School, Judo, Karate and Dancing. Representatives are still required from the Tiny Tots and the Drama Group. Anyone whose child attends these organisations is welcome to come forward - just check with your organisation and then contact Kirsty on 520738.

Kirsty thanked George Anderson the retiring secretary, who has been forced to give up on health grounds, Finlay McFee, the outgoing Treasurer and Lorraine McFee, who was responsible for all invoicing, for their work and commitment to the Community Association over the last 4 years. George and Finlay were each presented with a pewter quach as a memento of their involvement, while Lorraine received a pewter photograph frame.

In closing the meeting Kirsty highlighted the positive aspects of the recent crisis. We now have a larger, more representative committee who are committed to taking the Association forward and building on the work of previous committees. She thanked everyone for their attendance and noted that many of those present, although not elected to the committee, have volunteered their time and effort for future events like the Christmas lights social evening and next year's Gala.

Even if you were unable to get along to the meeting it is not too late to volunteer to help out with the Community Association. Perhaps you are a tradesman who could help out from time to time with any maintenance problems at the centre or maybe you would like to put your name down now to help out at next year's Gala? The other area where help is needed is with the bouncy castle. There are bouncy castle parties held most weekends at the centre and the user groups who meet prior to the parties are extremely accommodating and put the castle up for the parties. At the end of the parties however we need two, or preferably three people to put the castle away. At present this tends to fall on the same people all the time. Would you be willing to put your name on a rota to help out? The idea is to form small teams of three, each with someone who "knows the ropes" and by doing this, we could spread the load, with each team only having to take a turn every three or four weeks. It only takes half an hour each time, can you help? By coming together, the community has ensured that the Community Association can continue to function and that the centre, the Village News, the Christmas light social evening and the Gala weekend have been saved. Community spirit really is alive and well in Wemyss Bay! Thank you.

## Wemyss Bay Pharmacy

Make your pharmacy your first port of call for all health matters – after all Brian Spence, your local pharmacist is a medicines expert. Nowadays, as well as dispensing medicines, pharmacists offer an increasingly varied range of services aimed at helping you take charge of your health.

They dispense both NHS and private prescriptions using a computer system which automatically monitors your medicines for possible interactions. It is in your interest therefore, if you always use the same pharmacy as this enables your prescription history to be as comprehensive as possible. They also deliver dispensed prescriptions to housebound patients and collect repeat prescriptions from the local surgeries and also from both Greenock and Gourock Health Centres. They offer simple homeopathic remedies and, for patients who have difficulty with their medicines, can even prepare weekly medication cassettes.

The pharmacy has also recently started offering blood pressure screening so, if you are over 18 and have not had yours checked for a while, it is worth popping in. Many people who appear to be perfectly fit have blood pressure problems that they are unaware of. Untreated, blood pressure can cause a number of serious health problems so it is important to have yours checked from time to time.

You should have a rummage through your cupboards now and then. If you find that you have unwanted out of date medication take it along to the pharmacy. They run a nationwide DUMP (Disposal of Unwanted Medicines) campaign so please return all unwanted medicines and they will be disposed of safely.

In addition to counter medicines, first aid, and holiday supplies there is also a good choice of gifts and affordable toys. Look out for all the Christmas stock appearing in the next couple of months.

Brian and all the staff are available to give advice from 9.00am – 6.00pm Monday to Friday (closed for lunch 1pm – 2pm) and from 9.00am – 1.00pm on Saturdays. Details of emergency dispensing services after hours, on Sundays and on public holidays are displayed on the notice board in the surgery and in the local press. If all else fails, the police hold a list of the out of hour's service.

## **Councillor Eric Forbes**

COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION - well done to those who turned up on 1 September and made sure that they had a working committee and community support. I listened to Office Bearers who had a strong commitment to make sure the Association was a success. Good luck to them.

PARKING AT WEMYSS BAY PIERHEAD - this has now turned into an even bigger frustration exercise than what was there previously and therefore at times a parking place is a good find. Certain changes have reduced the number of places available. However we cannot excuse those car owners who just indiscriminately park (abandon) where they see fit causing obstruction and breaking the law. We know, and all accept, that the existing circumstances are not geared up to cope with the present demand never mind the future but everyone should adhere to the parking regulations and respect why they are in place. Businesses have to be serviced and that is a fact. Bus stops have to be observed and, until that changes, we are where we are. There has been a lot of public exposure and lobbying and I will continue to have dialogue with the stakeholders to see if we can change the set up. Regulations have to be policed and that could result in an expensive visit to Wemyss Bay. It will not be solved tomorrow, therefore I ask that Wemyss Bay residents play their part when down at the pierhead.

SPAR CAR PARK - I am led to believe that some consideration is being given to increasing the number of parking spaces to include parking for the disabled.

WOODLANDS ASSOCIATION - the small but happy band of volunteers are continuing to do their bit and the formal contractual work in the main woods will start soon. The end result will be a place to go and spend some relaxing time in a managed woodland. We should all be supportive of this community initiative.

LEVEN ROAD TREES - the legal process has started and it is now in the hands of the Procurator Fiscal for his/her consideration. The requirement is on the landowner to present a re-planting plan which is acceptable to the Council Officers and is commensurate with the provisions of the Tree Planting Orders legislation. We shall wait and see, and then another part of the process will kick in.

## **Meeting to Discuss Station and Ferry Problems**

The Greenock Telegraph reported that Councillor Alistair Watson, chair of Strathclyde Passenger Transport Authority, is arranging a meeting shortly to discuss various issues relating to Wemyss Bay Station and pier and the surrounding area. These issues will include the state of the station itself, car parking issues, the pedestrian crossing, the relocation of the bus stop and parking permits for residents. Councillor, Eric Forbes and Duncan McNeil MSP have also been involved in the discussions.

## **Scottish Parliament Update – Duncan McNeil MSP**

While the campaign against NHS Argyll and Clyde's deeply flawed Clinical Strategy is taking up by far the greatest proportion of my time both here and at Holyrood, it is not the only matter sitting in my in-tray.

The ongoing problems at Wemyss Bay station and ferry terminal, for example, continue to be a source of aggravation for residents, passengers and businesses.

Equally unhappy with the current situation is Cllr Alistair Watson, Chair of Strathclyde Passenger Transport Authority, who, as you may recall, was appalled at the state of the railway station when I met him there recently.

I am also aware that tourism chiefs are concerned at the message the state of the station and terminal sends to locals and to visitors.

That is why what is being dubbed a "summit meeting" of the key players is to be held in the near future. This offers, I hope, a chance to put in place a sustainable maintenance programme and address parking space – which is essential for any major transport interchange.

Of course, it would be naïve to think that the interests of ferry passengers, local residents, the transport authorities, local businesses and everyone else will be in complete harmony. But surely it cannot be beyond us to come to a solution which we can all accept and which fulfils the potential of these valuable local assets.

### **David Cairns MP**

Just one topic has dominated our area over the last few months – the future of Inverclyde Royal Hospital. I have to admit to being utterly dismayed at the proposals by Argyll and Clyde Health Board to downgrade the IRH and move key services to Paisley. I accept that they have real problems to deal with, but centralising everything at one super-hospital is not the way forward.

Thankfully, in recent weeks, I get a sense that the tide may just be beginning to turn. I have argued publicly that we can't solve the problems of the NHS "one-hospital-at-a-time" and that we need a national solution to what are, after all, national problems in our national health service. So I was delighted at the announcement of a commission led by Professor David Kerr of Oxford University, to devise just such a national framework, and even more delighted when he accepted our invitation to make Inverclyde his first port of call.

So while it is far too early to put out the bunting, we now have a real chance to move beyond the narrow options of Argyll and Clyde Health Board and have a proper national debate about what our NHS should look like in the 21<sup>st</sup> century. We may not get everything that we want, but we will ensure that our voice is heard and that the problems of an area such as Inverclyde cannot be ignored, or left to the mercy of an un-elected and unaccountable health board, the majority of whose members neither work nor live in Inverclyde.
