Scottish Parliament Report from Duncan McNeil MSP

A quick thanks, first of all, to everyone who attended the coffee morning David Cairns and I held recently in St Joseph's and St Patrick's. As a politician, it's always good when plenty of people want to engage with you, even if that engagement is to make a complaint or get something off their chest.

One issue which came up a number of times – and which many also took the opportunity to discuss with the police, who had kindly agreed to attend – was antisocial behaviour. Now, there is no suggestion that antisocial behaviour in Wemyss Bay is anything like as vicious or serious as it is in other parts of the country, or indeed my constituency. But that doesn't excuse it. Yobbish, intimidating behaviour – wherever it happens – has to be challenged. Thankfully, the toughest provisions of the new Antisocial Behaviour Act, which the Executive secured in the face of fierce opposition from the right-on brigade and other political parties, have now come into force, allowing the police to disperse groups of youths in designated trouble spots. The genuine beauty of Inverclyde on a cold, crisp winter's day is one of the highlights of my winter. And I don't believe we should let the selfishness of others spoil it.

May I also take this opportunity to wish you a merry Christmas and a happy and prosperous New Year.

Councillor Eric Forbes

Mobile phone mast at Forbes Place - For the third time the phone company has asked for its application to be continued and not presented at this time to the Planning committee. The reason for this is that they want more time to carry out further investigations. We shall just have to await the outcome and deal with the application should it come before the committee in the future.

Parking at Wemyss Bay Pierhead - I am still receiving a few complaints about the indiscriminate parking here which causes obstruction and frustration to those who want to park legally. On-going discussions are taking place to look at providing further parking places but these are at a very early stage. I thank you for your co-operation.

Refurbishment to Primary School - Proposals for the design of the new extension and refurbishment of Wemyss Bay Primary should begin to surface early next year (2005), around January or February following which consultation will take place. The extension will affect the surrounds of the school and discussions will have to take place with interested parties to see how these issues will be addressed.

Secondary School proposals - The consultation period for the Secondary School proposals has now finished and as can be seen from the recent articles in the Greenock Telegraph there was a large response. The report to go before the Education Committee is in the process of being completed by the Director and his Officers and we shall await the production of that and then further deliberations will take place before any final decisions are taken. It may require a Special meeting to consider the issues.

Contact Me - Over the past year I have dealt with complaints and issues brought to my attention and I have been successful with most of them and when a resolution was not possible at the time I am either still dealing with it or the matter has now been concluded. I am not always able to solve issues to everyone's satisfaction simply because at times it is outwith Council control but I certainly alert the appropriate person/agency to the problem and I thank everybody for being the eyes and ears of the village and surrounds. It is only through partnership, co-operation and understanding that we will continue to work for the betterment of Wemyss Bay. Woodland Association

The Association ran into further problems last month when the contractor who had initially won the tender to carry out work put up his price by 25% to carry out 75% of the work in the initial tender. Legal difficulties over access had caused delays however an increase of this amount within a short period of time was totally unacceptable. There was no option but to run the tender again and this has taken place. A successful contractor will be identified by the beginning of December and work will start prior to Christmas for a 12-week period (not including the holidays). The work which will be carried out in this initial phase includes essential tree surgery, creation of paths, some levelling and planting work and installation of seats and benches.

The Association is already considering what should be included in the second phase. It is likely that the parking / service bay which had to be shelved in phase 1 will be included along with a short family cycle path. Other possibilities are also being considered at this time and will be discussed at the Association's AGM which will be held at 7.30pm in the Community Centre on Sunday 23rd January.

It is not too late to make donations to the Bulb Fund as in addition to spring-flowering bulbs we will be purchasing a variety of wildflowers to be planted in spring. Cheques, made payable to Wemyss Bay Community Woodland Association, can be sent to **Eila Roberts 14 Brueacre Drive, Wemyss Bay** or left in a sealed envelope in the Village News folder behind the counter in Spar. Alternatively if you have bulbs which you do not require telephone Eila on **529375** to arrange for them to be uplifted.

You can also get involved with the work of the Association by helping out at one of the working weekends. The next one takes place on Sat 11th and Sunday 12th December from 10am – 3pm. All tools, gloves and refreshments are provided and volunteers meet at the Ardgowan Road end of Cliff Terrace Road. Unfortunately numbers have been dwindling at the weekends and we rely on a small core group of volunteers. In addition to getting through more work, a few new faces now and then would really help the morale of the die-hards!

The Woodland Association will have a stall in the Community Centre at the Christmas Lights Switch On and will be selling toys, made of wood or with a nature theme, which will make ideal stocking fillers.
