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Asian Tsunami

No-one can have failed to be moved recently by the scenes of total destruction following the recent tsunami which affected many counties surrounding the Indian Ocean. The number of deaths stood at over 220,000 when the Village News went to the printers, with a further 20,000 missing – a number which is virtually impossible to comprehend. In addition over 1.8million people are homeless or displaced. As an island nation ourselves we grappled to come to terms with what it would have meant for us. Over one third of the dead are children and even for those who survived many are now orphans. Deaths were reported in Indonesia, Sri Lanka, Thailand, India, the Andaman & Nicobar Islands, Maldives, Malaysia, Burma, Bangladesh, Somalia, Kenya, Tanzania and Seychelles.

The British public is on target to donate almost £200m, the largest amount ever for any disaster appeal. Many local people have chosen to donate online, at banks, building societies & the post office, by sending cheques to the Disaster Emergency Committee or directly to some of the many charities involved, and by making cash donations at some of the many collection points in shops. Shortly after the appeal was launched, staff in Wemyss Bay Spar placed a collection bucket on the counter. When we went to print the total reached was £1430 and set to keep on rising. Well done to everyone who contributed. Remember that the requirement for aid stretches beyond the immediate need of food, medicine and emergency shelter to the long time rebuilding of many shattered nations. You can continue to donate at Spar, at your bank, building society, post office or directly online to the Disaster Emergency Committee www.dec.org.uk. Remember if you are a tax payer to tick the gift aid box or confirm it in writing with your donation as, in this way, the charities can reclaim the tax you have already paid from the taxman. This doesn't cost you anything but increases your donation by 28pence in every pound: a £10 donation from you is worth £12.80 to them.

Arthur Brocklebank

My name is Arthur Brocklebank. When I was 11 my father and mother and I came to live in Wemyss Bay, having been bombed out during the Greenock blitz.

As my father was organist at the English Episcopal church on Inverclyde's estate, Lord Inverclyde invited us to stay at the castle for a couple of nights until he made enquiries in the area about accommodation for us. He approached Mr Stewart of Dunloe and suggested opening up Ardvaar. This was agreed and we moved in with what possessions we could rescue from our wrecked house in Caddlehill Terrace in Greenock. Soon, other evacuees moved in and we became a small happy community.

Every day, I caught one of Dunlop's buses at the Smithy to take me to Greenock Academy. Dunlop's buses found the hill from the Hotel on the main road quite a challenge especially if they were full.

It did not take me long to meet up with some of the boys and girls who lived close by and I remember Hugh and Nan Barr, Ronnie Herbert and Ian Ramsey from the grocer's shop particularly well.

I joined the Skelmorlie Scouts with Mr Alexander as the Scoutmaster and headteacher of the primary school, *delivered* fish on my bike round the area from Smith's fish shop in the village, joined the Skelmorlie tennis club, fished off the rocks in borrowed boats below Ardvaar for mackerel and plaice, played and got many a soaking in the famous creek, and, on Saturdays and Sundays, delivered milk with horse and cart from the estate farm. The horse was named "Boy".

The arrival of the Americans with their armoured cars and tanks brought great excitement to the village. Pearson's garage had the job of welding on exhaust snorkels to the vehicles, and when the beach was covered in concrete it was fun running to welcome the landing craft when they crossed over from Rothesay. We were told, secretly, that these Americans were training for landings in Sicily.

The estate walled garden above the castle was kept going during the war years and we boys had great adventures clambering over the wall to pinch some apples. Often the gardener would come round which forced us to lie face down until he passed by. We were never caught!

My father joined the local Home Guard; one of his duties being to guard Wemyss Bay pier at night against invasion by the Germans with his rifle and one bullet.

A year after the war ended, we left Ardvaar and returned home.

These were happy years but, at the age of 75, I have forgotten nearly all the names of the many friends I made. I would be delighted, if any of my contemporaries from those days are still alive, would care to get in touch. I now live in Dingwall.

Woodland Association

As most people will be aware by now, work started in the main wood at the beginning of January. They are making significant progress with the rhododendron clearance and have also started work in the central barren area and on the path creation. The contractor will be responsible for the removal of the remaining one third of the rhododendron; carrying out essential tree surgery; limited thinning of sycamore; some levelling in the central area of the wood to include addition of top soil and seeding; construction and maintenance of main and secondary paths; chemical treatment of Japanese knotweed and rhododendron ponticum over a five year period; and the construction of informal seating and installation of benches.

Throughout the past year volunteers have worked tirelessly on rhododendron removal within the main wood. As part of the funding package, the Association had to commit to providing a £10,000 donation in kind, which amounted to 1600 hours of volunteer labour. Over the course of the year there have been 49 work days worth volunteers amassing 1906 hours, considerably more than the minimum required. In this time two thirds of the rhododendron has been removed including that in some of the densest areas. Working weekends continue on a fortnightly basis. During the time that contractors are working the Association will concentrate its attention on the terraced gardens however, as soon as the contractors finish there will be more work to be carried out in the main wood, particularly involving planting of wildflowers and shrubs. We will also continue our work on the ditch and drainage along Cliff Terrace Road and already the path is considerable drier underfoot. We are aware that over the past few weeks with the torrential rain, the drain has not been coping with the volume of water and we will continue working on this alongside Inverclyde council to improve things.

The Roads Department have recently been clearing the overhanging vegetation along Ardgowan Road to improve road safety. We welcome this but hasten to point out that this is totally unconnected to the work of the Association and any comments or problems connected to this should be directed to the Roads Department, or your local councillor.

In the next few weeks volunteers will be working on cutting wood to size for bird and bat boxes. The "kits" will then be taken into the school, to involve the children in the construction. Thereafter they will help site the boxes and will take part in the ongoing monitoring of our local bird population. We are appealing for donations of untreated wood around 150mm wide and 15mm thick and, if you would be prepared to help with cutting the wood to size we would be very grateful to hear from you. Contact **Eila on 529375**. Bird boxes should only be treated on the outside while it is essential that for bats the wood is totally untreated. If you would like leaflets on constructing boxes for your own garden contact us and we will provide them.

Our volunteer work sessions continue on a fortnightly basis. As usual we meet at the Ardgowan Road end of Cliff Terrace Road at 10am and work until 3pm. Gloves, tools and refreshments are provided. Recently some people have been along with their children for the first time and were amazed at how much they enjoyed themselves. Why don't you give it a go at one of our forthcoming sessions: Sat 5th & Sun 6th and Sat 19th & Sun 20th February, Sat 5th & Sun 6th and Sat 19th & Sun 20th March. Telephone Scam

In case you may have missed recent publicity regarding the latest wave of phone scams, we have been asked by Strathclyde Police to bring this to your attention. It applies to home and/or work telephones, land lines and mobiles.

If you do receive one of these calls, upon answering the telephone, you will hear a recorded message congratulating you on winning an all expenses trip to an exotic location. You will then be asked to press 9 to hear further details. If you press 9 you will be connected to a premium rate line that costs up to £20 per minute. Even if you disconnect immediately, if you have already pressed 9, it will remain connected for a minimum of 5 minutes, costing around £100. The final part of the call involves you being asked to key your postcode and house number (which can have other undesirable consequences). After a further 2 minutes you will receive a message informing you that you are not one of the lucky winners. The total bill will be £260 and you won't discover this till your bill arrives some weeks later.

Since these calls are originating from outside the UK, BT and other telephone companies are left relatively powerless to act. The only safe solution is to HANG UP before the message prompts you to press 9; even safer is to HANG UP on any unsolicited 'free offer' call. This appears to be a variation on a theme, warnings have been sent previously regarding calls made by individuals claiming to be engineers conducting a test on the line and asking for 9, 0# and text messages similar to the routine described above. DO NOT DIAL 9 (or 9, 0# or 0, 9#) FOR ANYONE! BT has been contacted and confirmed the details as being true.

There is also another scam which mobile phone users should be made aware of: A "Missed Call" comes up. The number is 0709 020 3840 or similar. (The last few numbers may vary, but the first number will remain the same.) If you call this number back, you will be charged £50 per minute. People have complained about their phone bills, once they have realised the cost of the call but apparently this is completely legal. So beware, do not call back numbers beginning with 0709.

Scottish Parliamentary Report, Duncan McNeil MSP

Most of us have working environments which are fairly stressful and hectic. But can you imagine, instead of being interrupted by stupid emails from head office every 5 minutes, or having to listen to Doreen from accounts tell everyone with whom she has a telephone conversation the same pointless anecdote about one of her children, you had to try to work in noisy chaos, punctuated periodically with shouts of abuse aimed at the boss from the headbangers up the back? You simply wouldn't tolerate it.

So why should our children put up with it in the classroom? As HM Inspectorate of Education confirms, our children's education is already suffering thanks to the terrible state of our school buildings, but their learning environment shouldn't be made even worse by unruly, disruptive pupils.

You don't need to be an expert on education to know that good learning requires good order in the classroom. And, to help teachers reduce indiscipline, Inverclyde has been given £128,542 by the Scottish Executive to recruit new educational support staff – including learning support assistants, classroom assistants and pupil support base staff.

These staff, as Education Minister Peter Peacock says, "will free teachers to teach the new curriculum, help all pupils to learn undisturbed and deal intensively with those pupils who need it most."

David Cairns MP : Inverclyde People Help Tsunami Victims

None of us will ever forget the terrible suffering the people of Asia experienced on Boxing Day. While we were settling down to recover from Christmas, a huge tidal wave was heading across the Indian Ocean to wipe out coastal towns and villages in a dozen countries. Whole areas were devastated, over a million were left homeless and the death toll is relentlessly marching towards the 250,000 mark.

At times like we realise that we really do live in a global village, and the response of the people in Greenock and Inverclyde to this tragedy has been tremendous. Local churches had special collections, some raising over £10,000, schools had cake and candy stalls and people all over the constituency felt moved to hold fundraising events. I've lost count of the number of Tsunami fundraisers I've seen in the local paper, and one constituent even handed £30 into my office and asked me to send it to Asia.

These are magnificent efforts and I'm pleased to say that local generosity has been matched by action from the British Government. The United Kingdom has already committed £75 million to immediate humanitarian aid and the Prime Minister has made it clear that our final aid package will top £200 million. None of this money will be diverted from other Third World countries, and our determination to tackle poverty and HIV/AIDS in Africa remains as strong as ever.

The Tsunami was an unprecedented disaster hitting a huge area and nobody could have been prepared for the scale of the devastation. Yet within 24 hours the Department for International Development had distributed £1 million worth of aid, including the dispatch of an aircraft carrying emergency supplies. I don't believe that either the government or the people of Greenock and Inverclyde will suffer from compassion fatigue. We are all in this for the long haul, and we will continue giving aid until the people in these countries can rebuild their towns and villages and get their economies back on a firm footing.

Inverkip and Wemyss Bay Community Council News

Remembrance Sunday 14th November 2004: The people of Wemyss Bay turned out to remember the brave citizens who gave their lives during conflict and war in order to protect our freedom. Although the weather was cold and windy we had a good turnout. All age groups were represented, as were the churches, from a wreath laid by a senior citizen to those laid on behalf of the various youth organisations present.

Community police officers: We now have two community police officers between both villages Kenny Wilson has now been joined by Lesley Strachan.

Mobile Phone and Tetra Masts: We need strict safety rules to protect residents from the possible health effects of mobile phones and Tetra masts. The *Telegraphs* investigation which found at least 33 phone masts in Inverclyde. At the moment, health fears aren't a reason to reject an application for a new phone mast. It would be more beneficial if phone companies were forced to share masts. This would cut the numbers by as much as 75 per cent across the country. People have genuine health concerns. The Scottish Executive should be looking at the emission levels and then make a decision on whether we need a change in planning legislation to allow health concerns to be considered. Our Local MP David Cairns said he has regular meetings with mobile phone companies and passes on the concerns of constituents. He said there was no evidence of a risk to human health but young children shouldn't use the phones while their skulls are not as thick. He said: "The companies contend they have done a good amount of research. They also state there's no evidence these masts are harmful. Council leader Alan Blair said planning bosses had no choice but to accept the opinions of experts. If a mast was rejected on health grounds, the Scottish Executive could overturn it on appeal. The only way to stop more of these applications being passed is for the community to object to each application as it is put forward."

We also call for the Scottish Parliament to take the necessary steps to delay the installation of terrestrial trunked radio (TETRA) communications masts in Scotland until potential health risks have been properly assessed and the relevant planning guidance has been amended to incorporate appropriate mandatory health and safety standards. These masts will be used by the police service and literature regarding these, advises that they should be strongly objected to.
