Improvement Proposals by Cliff Terrace Road Residents

Last year, residents raised funds to lay a new road and clean up the common ground bordering Cedar Walk/Cliff Terrace Road, more work is required this year.

The residents met on the middle of March to discuss improvements and annual maintenance of verges etc. At this meeting and having listened to local opinion, it is proposed, [by donating funds and labour], to plant out the area, sensitive to the local wildlife [no, not the hoodlums] with indigenous wildflower bulbs, bushes and trees.

Currently discussions are under way to secure this work. By implementing this plan, we will assist and attract local wildlife and hopefully make the environment more attractive for everyone.

If this proposal is accepted by the residents of Cedar and Larch Walk, volunteers would be required to help further tidy and prepare this piece of land for planting on Sunday 17th of April.

In the past, the common ground was overgrown and unkempt; it looked as if nobody cared. Fly tipping and dumping of garden refuse onto the area led to rat infestation and misuse. Well, people do care and as these improvements come from residents and not council funds, any further tipping or dumping of garden refuse, or the theft of plants and vandalism, will be reported to the council. The Council endorses the resident's endeavours and have confirmed that they will act by fining or will issue Anti Social Behaviour orders.

We look forward to meeting those that care about this area and have an hour or two to spare on **Sunday 17th April** from 10am onwards.

Parking Around the School: This very important issue has again been raised with me. There is concern that the movement of cars around the school gates etc. raises safety issues for the children making their way into school.

The question of road safety will be taken into account when the school extension and refurbishment is being designed and decided on and this will involve all the stakeholders.

In the meantime I would ask those parents, who transport their children to school by car, to consider parking away from the school and walking the short distance to it. I would crave your indulgence in this.

New System of Waste Uplift: By the time you read this newsletter the new bins will have been delivered and we will be in the business of separating our waste into the appropriate bins. It is a new way of treating our waste and, if there are any problems, these should be brought to our attention so that they can be addressed timeously.

This is the way ahead for the council to address the recycling of waste, in order that financial penalties are not imposed on us for failing to reach the targets laid down by the Scottish Executive.

I sincerely hope that you will make every effort to adhere to the instructions for use as in this way we can move forward.

Woodlands: I thank all the people who have spoken to me and sent e-mails about the vast improvements in the woods. It is now a much more user friendly place for all.

I have been approached however regarding the illegal practice of fly-tipping of garden waste and other rubbish in the woods. This is not very clever and means that all the good work done and the finance spent on the improvements will become a total waste of investment.

Fly-tipping is an offence and the penalties are high if anyone is caught doing it. If someone has the energy to gather up their waste or rubbish and take it to the woods then why not take it to the appropriate depository. *(At present at Kirn Drive, Gourock or Pottery Street, Greenock, although once the new bins arrive garden waste can be recycled in this way.)*

Help is still needed at the fortnightly working weekends run by the Woodland Association and new volunteers are always greatly appreciated.

David Cairns MP - What the Budget means for you

This year's budget had a number of measures to help pensioners, children and hard working families, but sometimes it can be difficult to work out what this will mean for you. So I thought I'd put together a quick budget guide so you can see, at a glance, how the changes will affect you.

Wemyss Bay families with children will benefit from increases in Child Benefit and Child Tax Credit. Most help goes to those on lower incomes, but families who have a joint income of up to £55,000 per year can now qualify for Child Tax Credits and some people will be better off by as much as £335 per year.

Young couples looking to buy their first house in the village will not have to pay Stamp Duty unless their home costs more than £120,000. Stamp Duty was previously payable £60,000, so first time buyers will save £1,200. This is a big saving for first time buyers and will mean that many young couples can buy a better first home.

Savers will also be happy to know that the Chancellor extended the life of Individual Savings Accounts (ISAs) until 2010. There was speculation that the tax free limit of £7,000 would be reduced but the accounts were so popular – particularly the cash ISAs with their lower £3,000 annual limit – that Gordon Brown decided to keep the tax break for another few years.

Local pensioners over 65 will be pleased to hear that they are getting £200 to help them pay their council tax to Inverclyde Council. The £200 heating allowance will also continue and for pensioners, and for over 80s there will be an additional £100 to help out with winter fuel bills. Inheritance tax thresholds will rise steadily over the next few years to £300,000 in 2007, so families can pass more of their hard earned money on to their children and grandchildren.

Having a Party?

If you are thinking of having a party, why not hold it at the Community Centre? Although it is pretty busy, party bookings are still available outwith the regular lets. Even better, why not theme your party? When placing your booking just say if you would like a Bouncy Castle Party or would like DJs "Disco Divas" to provide your entertainment. A 2-hour Bouncy castle Party costs £52, while a 2-hour Disco booking only costs £50. To make your booking or for more information contact Kirsty on 520738.

Remember that if you are having food at your party, the centre's kitchen was refurbished last year and is available for your use.

Woodland Association

We have received further reports of fly-tipping. On one occasion a resident of Linnhe Road was spotted dumping three barrow-loads of garden waste in the woods. This is illegal and carries heavy penalties. Local authorities have the power to impose fines and can even pursue the matter through the courts under the new Anti-Social Behaviour legislation. The woods are not a dumping ground and fly-tipping spoils other people's enjoyment. Illegal dumping doesn't just spoil the view, it endangers wildlife and affects your wallet – according to figures released by Keep Scotland Beautiful it costs taxpayers £11 million every year. If you witness fly-tipping, or find a fly-tipping site, help keep Wemyss Bay Tidy by contacting Inverclyde Council on **717171** or by calling the new National Fly-tipping Stop Line on **08452 304090**.

We are now at the planning stage of phase 2. The disabled parking space, which was planned for phase 1, had to be put on hold due to land ownership problems and a shortage of funds and this will be addressed in the next phase. Similarly provision for a cycle path has already been discussed and we would anticipate including this in the next phase, subject to approval during the forthcoming public consultation and the agreement of Inverclyde Council, the landowners of the wood. We do however

require your input at this stage: is there anything which you believe should be incorporated into our plans, or is there something which you would definitely not want? The only way that we can be sure that we are taking forward the wishes of the community is if people let us know what they think so don't be shy!

We have put up some bird boxes and will be putting up more as well as bat boxes and hibernation chambers for ladybirds and lacewings, in order to encourage local biodiversity. In order to do this we first of all have to obtain the wood and make the boxes! Do you have any timber or plywood lying around that you do not need? The minimum width we require is 150mm and it must be at least 15mm thick. Although bird boxes can be treated on the outside with water-based preservatives, bat-boxes must be made from untreated wood. If you have the skills to make the boxes we can provide instruction leaflets to guide you. We intend starting up our popular Guided Walks programme again this year now that the initial works have been completed. Previous walks including Folklore of Plants, Fungi Forage, Treasure Hunt, Mini-Beast Safari and How a Woodland Works will be included in this year's programme along with new topics such as Bird Identification. Dates for the walks will be publicised through the Village News and are open to both members and non-members.

Our Open Day will go ahead towards the end of April or beginning of May however the date has still to be confirmed – we are waiting for confirmation from the council before we can go ahead finalise things. We do however intend running a number of activities on the day to suit young and not so young alike. Look out for further details in the local press and Village News. Finally our work sessions continue on a fortnightly basis, working on both Saturdays and Sundays from 10.00am – 3.00pm. We continue to work in the terraced garden area and the usual details apply. Seaview Café

The Seaview Café reopened recently following a ten-day closure for major refurbishment. Work included new flooring, panelling, counters, lighting, ventilation system and a complete refit of the kitchen and bakery areas, in addition to a fresh lick of paint all round. If you have visited since the changes, you cannot fail to have been impressed. The kitchen has now doubled in size and the bakery now produces over 80% of the café's range of cakes, and biscuits.

There are a number of special promotions available including the Early Bird Special (a cup of tea or coffee with a pastry from £1.39), Early Bird Special (a cup of tea or coffee with a hot filled roll from £1.69) and the Soup and Sandwich Special (a bowl of homemade soup and a sandwich from £2.99). In addition from Monday to Friday from 3.30pm, with every adult meal purchased you can receive one kid's meal for only 99p. One of the most popular promotions is the Coffee Club whereby whenever you purchase a cup of coffee you have your card stamp and your tenth cup is free – your card is then entered into a prize draw to win a kilo of premium coffee beans.

The recent changes along with plans for further improvements to come provide scope to expand the menu even more in the future. The one thing that has not changed is the warm welcome you receive from Loretta and staff and the choice and quality of the menu.

Situations Vacant

Benefits: The above posts are unpaid, have no pension scheme, provide no sickness cover or holidays but you will be entitled to attend the party to end all parties later in the year!!!

How to improve access to NHS dental services – and how we get more people to actually use them when they're there – has been a long-standing problem for Ministers.

After years of investigation and consultation, however, the long-awaited overhaul of NHS dentistry services has now been published.

There's a lot in the package, which will be supported by additional investment of £150 million over three years. It aims to deliver over 200 extra dentists and have 400,000 more people registered with an NHS dentist by 2008. A range of recruitment and retention measures will also be introduced, including giving dental students a bursary if they agree to work for the NHS for five years after graduating. (An idea, incidentally, I think could be worth exploring for other medical professions.)

Alongside this, however, there is also much emphasis on prevention. Our oral health record – especially in the west of Scotland – is appalling and the plan aims to turn this round by getting the importance of looking after your teeth drummed into kids at a young age.

By March 2008, therefore, every child will have access to dental care on starting nursery – an extra 50,000 children every year. Scotland will also have the largest supervised tooth brushing programme in Europe, with over 120,000 children receiving free toothbrushes and toothpaste and taking part in daily brushing at nurseries and schools across the country.

A combination of past mistakes and the Scottish sweet tooth has led to this serious situation. The only way to address it, therefore, is through the government taking the right decisions and the rest of us taking a bit better care of our teeth.
