Gala Weekend Friday 17th – Sunday 19th June

Put the dates in your diary now and don't miss out on the biggest and best Gala yet.

Friday night is Country and Western Night! Tickets will go on sale for this year's Friday night extravaganza from **Monday 6th - Thursday 16 June. They will be available from the Community Centre box office Mon – Fri from 6pm - 7.30pm and Sat & Sun 11.30 – 12.30 & 2.15 – 3.30.** Tickets are priced £5 for adults and £3 for under 12 year olds with the under 5s getting in free. We are also offering a family ticket which will admit two adults and two children and will cost £15. This year's Friday night event is a bit different from the usual ceilidh. We have decided to change the event this year to a Country and Western night with popular local band "The Midnight Rebels". The night will kick off at 7.30pm with the usual raffle, prizes, buffet, and themed merchandise on sale to make you look the part (sorry no spittoons supplied, you have to bring your own!). There will be prizes for the best dressed cowboys, cowgirls and Native Americans so why don't you look out those Steisons, brush your cowboy boots and get into the spirit of the evening. Last year was a complete sell out, so don't miss out this year! It's a great family night out! See you there! (Please note that the marquee will be a no-smoking area. You are welcome to smoke outside the tent.)

Saturday 18th is Gala Day with events starting at 12 noon when this year's Gala Queen, accompanied by her attendants, will officially open the Gala, ably assisted by Councillor Forbes. There will be a variety of stalls run by local organisations including the Brownies, Lending Library, PTA, Largs Gymnastics, Graffiti Dance Group, Mums and Tots and the Woodland Association. Once again the youth club will be running the tuck shop and the burger stall – last year all the burgers were sold out by 1.30pm so get along early if you are feeling peckish. AFD will be repeating their popular pie and Bovril stall (pie & Bovril £1, pie only £1, Bovril only £1!!). The Community Centre will be given over to the Guides tearoom – always a popular attraction with all the lovely home-baking.

Gala Day would not be complete without all the rides and fairground attractions for the young (and young at heart). This year they will be even bigger and better than before. There will still be the children's carousel and Bouncy Castle for the little ones, with the Giant Bouncy Slide for those a little older. In addition there will be some aimed at older children, teenagers and adults. Laser Quest is back again by popular request and for the first time we will have Equaliser and a Giant Inflatable Assault Course, which could develop into a competition for the whole family and is bound to provide loads of laughs. Stephen hopes that he will not be quite as muddy at the end of this year's Beat the Goalie.

"The Animal Man" will be coming along to the Gala bringing with him a selection of animals from the well-known rabbits and Guinea pigs to the more exotic snakes, giant cockroaches and tarantulas! There will be an opportunity to see some of these animals close up and, for the more daring, you may even be able to pet them. In the centre, for the little ones, there will be a Punch and Judy show. There will be a tombola, putting competition, coconut shy, wheel of fortune, bottle stall, plant stall, Father's Day gifts (nice timing as this falls on the Sunday), wooden toys, Dancing gear, face-painting, Bookworm T-shirts and lots of other sideshows. This year's Balloon Race is sponsored by the Body Shop who have provided a fantastic prize (and will also be available for makeovers on the day) – tickets will be available at the box office in the fortnight leading up to the Gala, at the Barn Dance and on Gala Day.

This year, once again, the beer tent will be providing a range of alcoholic and soft drinks. Spirits, canned and bottled drinks will appear side by side with "Helga's Big Jugs", last year's sell-out beer from Houston Brewery. We will also have a wide range of soft drinks for the under-18s and drivers out there. Please note, we will not sell alcohol to anyone suspected of being under 18 and it is illegal to purchase alcohol on behalf of anyone underage. Anyone abusing this will be asked to leave as our licence would be in jeopardy if this was to happen and, should the police visit, we would be shut down. The bar will be open from 12noon until 5.30pm and from 7.00pm until 11.00pm. Throughout the weekend the marquee will be strictly a no-smoking area. You are welcome to smoke outwith the marquee but we decided to introduce this both from a safety point of view (canvas and naked flames really don't go together) and also from a health point of view for children and non-smokers.

Saturday night: After a short break from 5.30 – 7.00pm to allow us to clear up and make sure that we have enough glasses washed for the evening session, the bar will re-open and entertainment continue in the main marquee with a kid's disco followed by music and a karaoke special. There is no charge for this and everyone is welcome to come along and have a go. There will be prizes for the best singers and, of course, a booby prize for the worst. A lot of people think that they would never sing in public but, as the night goes on and you are caught up in the atmosphere, you will soon be belting out your favourite songs. Interspersed throughout the evening there will be quizzes and stand-up bingo, again with prizes.

Last year, for the first time, we had a soup kitchen and this proved so popular that we are running it again this year. If you are flagging a bit on Saturday night between 9.00 – 11.00pm, pop into the Community Centre for a choice of soup made by the Seaview Café. We will also be selling hot-dogs so make use of this to help soak up the alcohol a bit before you have to walk home.

Britain, they say, is a nation of animal lovers. Sadly, however, while that's true for most of us, a callous minority still continue to subject animals to cruelty to and neglect. And tackling the problem is not made any easier by the fact that the existing law is way out of date. It was designed for the 19th century, not the 21st.

The Scottish Parliament, therefore, has drawn up plans to update and reinforce the animal protection legislation. The draft Animal Health & Welfare (Scotland) Bill proposes to introduce a Duty of Care on animal keepers; allow animals to be taken into care before they start to suffer; raise the age for buying animals from 12 to 16; introduce a general prohibition on mutilations; and strengthen the law prohibiting animal fighting.

These proposals send out a clear message that animal cruelty will no longer be tolerated. I particularly support the plans to place a duty on animal owners to care for their animals, rather than just avoid cruelty. This, I believe, represents a fundamental – and welcome – shift in emphasis.

The draft Bill is now out to consultation, giving you the opportunity to help shape the reforms. If you care about animal welfare, I would urge you to make a submission.

Road safety issue has raised its head in the village and this is in relation to several complaints that I have received concerning the speed of traffic. Speeding is really within the power of the person behind the wheel and therefore care and control are exerted by them initially. However, the police are responsible for the enforcement of vehicle speed and I have informed the Traffic Department as well as the Community Officers who will give this complaint their attention. This does not refer only to private vehicles but also commercial vehicles and they too will be advised accordingly. Commonsense and good awareness of road conditions have to prevail otherwise it could result in someone being badly injured and this is not acceptable. Please play your part and make the roads safe.

I can report that discussions have taken place and it is certain that the 30mph speed limit will be extended westwards on the A78 to beyond the Wemyss Bay Hotel. I have had several complaints regarding speed etc. in this area and my approaches to the Scottish Executive have resulted in this action being taken.

A sum of money has been allocated to Inverclyde Council by WESTRANS and some of it will be used on a feasibility study and design exercise at Wemyss Bay Station for provision of a park and ride facility. Improved and additional car parking will go a long way to prevent the current unacceptable parking situation at Wemyss Bay pierhead. As a result of receiving this money I have also received an assurance that the bus shelter near Ardgowan Road outside North Lodge, which has been vandalised with graffiti, will be replaced during this financial year.

David Cairns MP - Argyll and Clyde Health Board Abolished

The abolition of the Argyll and Clyde Health Board by Health Minister, Andy Kerr MSP, was a brave decision - and I believe it was the right one. The Health Board had a long history of problems and despite numerous re-organisations, new managers and endless rounds of board meetings, in the end, the Health Board was unable to serve the needs of Inverclyde and it had to go. I could never understand how, at a time of record investment in health, the Board's financial deficit continued to grow, and I was frustrated that local people did not see the benefits from the extra funding given to Argyll and Clyde. The Health Minister's decision to write off Argyll and Clyde's £80 million debt gives the Greater Glasgow Health Board a chance to start with a clean slate and focus on delivering the services that Inverclyde needs.

But the Argyll and Clyde's problems were more than financial. They seemed unable to consult people properly about changes to our local hospitals and, despite public outrage at their proposals; they planned to press ahead with their hugely unpopular plans. And it was only the united opposition of our entire community that stopped them in their tracks.

At the end of the day bureaucratic structures don't really matter – it is services that are important. We need to focus on improving health care, and that's why I and my colleague, Duncan McNeil MSP, will be meeting the head of Greater Glasgow Health Board in the coming weeks. We need to make sure that the new Health Board has a clear picture of the services that we need here in Inverclyde, and I am determined to see that the mistakes of the past are not repeated. The Greater Glasgow Health Board has a good record and I want to make sure that they put the NHS in Inverclyde back on the road to recovery.
