Back to School

For some, first day at school can be a traumatic time with tears and tantrums, while others have been looking forward to it for months (and that is just the parents!). Didn't all the new primary 1s look great as they headed off to school in their uniforms? The Community Association hopes, that by now, everyone is settled in and enjoying this new experience.

At this time of year, with all the little ones starting out, it is appropriate to remind everyone of the potential dangers of parking around the school. Did you know that it is now recognised by experts that a child's road sense is not fully developed until the age of 11 – most of the time they are perfectly safe but occasionally, when distracted, or if they see someone they wish to speak to on the other side of the road, they just run out.

During both of the last two school years, a child has been knocked down around the school. Let's all work together to try and prevent a tragedy happening this year. Do not park on the zigzags – not only is it dangerous but it is also illegal. Use the car-park at the Community Association which is just a two-minute walk from the school with no roads to cross. The car-park at the shops is always particularly busy during drop-off and pick-up times. Please take particular care here and watch out for children running across the car-park, especially when reversing as many of the P1s and 2s are too little to be seen through your rear-view mirror. Do not park in the surgery car-park. It is reserved for patients and staff and it is essential that patients can get parked here quickly in the event of an emergency and similarly that the doctors can get out quickly if necessary. People often park right up to the corners of Lomond Road, Brueacre Road and the roads leading out on to them. This restricts the view of drivers trying to turn and is both dangerous and contrary to the Highway Code, which could result in the police taking action. Finally, please show consideration for those living in the immediate surrounding of the school and do not park across their driveways – how would you feel if they came along to your home and blocked you in?

If we all show some common sense we can ensure the safety of all the children on the roads around the school.

Woodland Association

During the summer holidays, the Woodland Association organised three very popular children's activity mornings. We hope to turn this into a regular event to encourage children to use the woods in a constructive way during their breaks.

Over the next two months two further events are planned which we hope will appeal to all ages and anyone is welcome to come along. There will be a 50p charge for both adults and children, to cover the costs of the events and also to help with the general running costs of the Association. As we require to bring in experts to lead these walks, dates have still to be finalised. Look out for more details in the next Village News and on posters around the village.

We will be holding a **Fungi Forage** during which we will identify and learn a bit more about some of the many species which grow in the wood. Some will be safe, some poisonous and some ugly!

We also intend holding a Bat Night, when we will be watching, identifying and finding out more about some of the different bats which live in Wemyss Bay, We will be walking through the woods and down towards the beach. Please remember and bring a torch.

We would like to thank everyone who contacted Inverclyde Council, and the Association, to report recent fly-tipping in the wood. The matter is in the hands of the council, who are aware of the perpetrators, and they will be taking appropriate action. If you see any instances of fly-tipping please contact Inverclyde Council on 717171 or the National Fly-Tipping Helpline on 08452 30 40 90. When caught, serious offenders will be dealt with by the courts. And, under the Antisocial Behaviour Bill, local authorities, the police and SEPA have the power to issue fixed penalty fines for less severe offences.

Littering is also a problem. The Woodland Association regularly organises clean-up sessions and last month removed 13 sacks of rubbish along with several buckets of broken glass. Some of the litter is wind-blown however the majority is dropped by people using the wood. During recent clear-ups we have removed several pairs of knickers and boxer shorts, tops, trousers, car batteries, kitchen units, a toilet, condoms and sanitary protection. There is a bin at the main entrance to the wood and another at the Morar Road entrance. Please use the bins or take your rubbish home with you.

The Woodland Association comprises many members of the community with a common interest in conserving Wemyss Bay Wood for the use and enjoyment by all the community. We have a small number of committed volunteers who turn out regularly for work sessions. We do not own the wood – it is owned by Inverclyde Council. None of us live in the woods 24 hours a day (although it seems like it sometimes). It is therefore the responsibility of all of us, whether we live near the wood, are walking through it, playing in it or working in it, to report any anti-social behaviour to the police and council.

WEMYSS BAY PRIMARY SCHOOL: The plans for the new school extension are almost nearing completion and it is hoped that they will be brought before the October (2005) Education Committee, with work planned to commence in June 2006. The work will take around 12 months to complete and by starting it during the school holidays it will allow the contractor to carry out necessary demolition and minimise disruption. It will be necessary to erect temporary accommodation and this will be done during the school holidays. I will keep the School Board regularly updated with the necessary information for parents. Mrs. Ritchie will also be fully aware of the work planned and will be working with the Education Department to make sure the day to day school programme goes on in as normal a fashion as possible.

ANTE- SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR: I have had some complaints of ante-social behaviour in the area of Cliff Terrace Road, Wallace Road and the beach area and this is rightly causing concern to the residents. I have had discussions with the police and extra attention is being given in the area. We also had some graffiti/damage caused to Wemyss Bay railway station and the police are also dealing with this.

On the question of graffiti: We are now seeing it appear on some walls and buildings and this affects the area and brings unwanted comments. To the artists I would say "please stop it" and to everyone else "please report it and the identity of anyone participating in this type of behaviour." Thanks for your help here.

COMMUNITY CENTRE: After a few hiccups we will see new flooring in parts of the hall and this has to be welcomed.

Burglaries

During August there were a number of break-ins around the village. How often have you nipped out to the shop, collected the kids from school or taken the dog for a walk and forgotten to lock your door? Or perhaps you get up in the morning to find that the garage door has been left wide open all night. Make it difficult for thieves by ensuring you lock your door every time you leave, check that garages, sheds and other outbuildings are secure and if you have a gate fit a lock.

One of the most concerning aspects of most of the burglaries was that they were carried out at night while the householders were asleep. You can help make your home more secure at night by fitting security lights around your home, paying particular attention to areas which cannot be seen by your neighbours. Best of all; arrange to have a burglar alarm fitted.

If you do spot anyone acting suspiciously around your home or those of your neighbours please phone the police immediately.
