## Kiddie Vandals

We have been contacted by a number of residents of Brueacre Drive about the continuing damage to shrubs and trees by children, some as young of four or five. When they purchased their homes residents of Brueacre Drive, Brueacre Place and the newer McLean houses in Mountstuart Drive paid to have the area landscaped and planted up and now pay a regular maintenance fee for the upkeep of the grass, bushes and trees alongside Brueacre Drive. On any dry day you will find groups of children playing in amongst the bushes. While no one minds children playing, when they wantonly damage the trees by pulling off branches or breaking them off near the ground, it becomes a different matter. Last year residents had to contribute, through their maintenance charges, to replacing dozens of shrubs which had been uprooted or seriously damaged by children. Already many of the new plants are dead and additional existing plants have been damaged to the point where they too will require to be replaced.

Many of the children involved do not live in Brueacre Drive and despite repeated requests to stop what they are doing, continue to damage the plants. Now some residents of Brueacre Drive have had enough and intend reporting further vandalism to the police. So, if your child regularly plays in the area and could be involved, perhaps it is time to reinforce the need to respect other peoples' property.

## Woodland Association

The Association had a very successful rhodi-bashing day when staff from Timberland joined them on 22nd September and are now looking forward to a similar day on Friday 7th October when a dozen members of staff from IBM will be coming along to help as part of an ongoing partnership between Scottish Businesses in the Community and Greenspace Scotland. It is great when we get outside help, as every additional volunteer really can make a difference, but it would be even better if we could make sure that even more local people came out to help.

## Councillor Eric Forbes

I think I should explain the Council's position with regard to what is happening on the trunk road (A78) and I refer specifically to two issues: loose water at the Lighthouse development and parking at Wemyss Bay pierhead.

In almost all instances the Council has no locus at all other than being a facilitator to pass on complaints and concerns. We are not the solvers of the problem.

In relation to the loose water on the road; this is part of a dialogue between the developer and the Scottish Executive. The Council are onlookers and I express considerable concern considering that we are coming into a worsening weather time of the year.

Parking at Wemyss Bay pierhead is a considerable discomfort to residents there but the Scottish Executive has made the decision to expand regulation and we as a Council can only pass on shared frustrations to the regulating authority.

These are two examples of where the Council is virtually an onlooker but affected by decisions taken away from us but have a profound effect on ourselves.

## **Ticket Prices**

Did you know that you can use a concessionary travel card on the 8.30am train from Largs to Glasgow Central but not on the 8.50am train from Wemyss Bay to Glasgow? This means that you either have to wait for an hour for the next train or pay the full price. This obviously discriminates against retired or disabled people travelling from Wemyss Bay. Perhaps if enough people complain to Strathclyde Passenger Transport then this situation will be changed.

## **Thanks Timberland**

On Thursday 22nd September staff from Timberland UK's Glasgow store joined members of the Woodland Association for a rhodi-bashing day. Seven volunteers came along and, despite the very wet start to the day, an enormous amount of rhododendron was well and truly bashed!

Timberland's founder and owner believes that it is important to put something back into the community and in order to do this every member of staff, in all of Timberland's stores throughout the world, gets paid leave to carry out voluntary work. Staff from Timberland came along to Wemyss Bay previously in April this year to assist the Woodland Association as part of World Earth Day. This time the event was "Serv-a-Palooza Day"; Timberland's own special day when staff from all their stores worldwide join together to help out conservation and environmental projects. Road Works: As Eric Forbes has explained in his article this month, the problem at "The Lighthouse" has been subject to ongoing discussions between the developer and the Scottish Executive, who ultimately have responsibility for trunk roads. As the Village News went to the printer further work has been completed and the problem seems to be resolved.

The Clock Tower: As yet we have not been able to find out about any planned repairs but hope to bring information in the next edition.

## David Cairns MP : Riverside Regeneration will Benefit All

You might wonder what the regeneration of Inverclyde's waterfront has to do with people living in Wemyss Bay, but the answer is quite a lot. There will be more quality housing, shopping and leisure facilities and, in the end, the whole area will benefit, not just those who live and work there.

I firmly believe that the River Clyde represents the future of our area, not just its past. New houses and amenities will help us attract new families to live here, send their children to local schools, spend money in local shops and contribute to our revival. We should not be afraid of the regeneration, but should see it as a vital step in the renewal of the entire community. But it is absolutely crucial that local people too can share in the benefits of regeneration. There are three steps that must be taken to make sure that this happens:

1. We must have a Local Employment Agreement with the developers to make sure that local people get their fair share of the work. If possible, we should also secure modern apprenticeships so that our young people can benefit.
2. We must ensure that local people can get access to the river along attractive and safe walk-ways and cycle paths. The benefits of the new developments must not be confined to those who live and work there.
3. We should maximize the benefits for the wider community by seeking improvements to the existing town-centres, and other Inverclyde facilities.

The Riverside Regeneration is a once-in-a-lifetime chance to bring about massive improvements to Inverclyde. We must not fail this time.

## Duncan McNeil MSP

If you're a smoker, I would hazard a guess that you don't think it was the smartest move you've ever made. I also imagine that you don't want your children to follow in your footsteps.

Important as support for smokers who want to give up is, we would all save a lot of time, effort and money if we could stop people taking up the deadly habit in the first place.

So how do we do it?

One move for which I have been campaigning is to raise the minimum age at which you can buy tobacco from 16 to 18.

For a start, this would end the anomaly of a pensioner committing a criminal offence if he smoked his pipe in his local, while it remained perfectly legal for his 16 year-old granddaughter to have a cigarette while waiting for the school bus. Also, the harder it is for young teenagers - who might pass for 16, but not 18 - to buy cigarettes, the less likely they are to get hooked for life.

And some progress has been made. When the Smoking, Health and Social Care Act was passed by the Scottish Parliament in June, it included my amendment to give Ministers the power to raise the minimum purchasing age. The issue is now being examined by a group of experts, led by Dr Laurence Gruer OBE, which will duly advise Ministers.

It's important that this Expert Group knows the facts. So, last month, I arranged for them to meet public health officials from Guernsey, where raising the minimum age has seen the number of young smokers halved. The Guernsey officials were more than happy to share their valuable experiences and certainly exploded some of the popular myths.

The job, however, is far from done. Despite the evidence, despite the backing of MSPs and the BMA, some scepticism remains. My efforts in the coming months, therefore, will be focused on building a cross-party consensus to make it clear that we want it to be as hard as possible for our children to make the worst decision of their lives.

## Bulb and Wildflower Appeal

The Woodland Association has planted over 5000 bulbs throughout Wemyss Bay Wood but, in order to help reintroduce native species this is a drop in the ocean. Again this year we are looking for your help. We are working in an area of almost 18 acres

so we need a lot of bulbs and wildflowers. If you are buying bulbs for your garden why not add an extra pack or two for the woods? We are specifically looking for Native British Bluebells, Snowdrops and Wood Anemones. We have already had several hundred daffodil bulbs donated and at present do not need anymore of these.

In addition we are looking for a variety of wildflowers including Bugle, Primroses, Ragged Robin, Devil's Bit Scabious and Kidney Vetch. As it is against the law to dig up wildflowers these will all have to be purchased from specialist suppliers. We can buy these in bulk to reduce costs (we can also buy bulbs in this way). As an example 50 Wood Anemones will cost us £14 while 50 primroses will cost £28.50 and the same number of scabious £37.

If you would like to make a donation towards the cost of the bulbs and wildflowers please make a cheque payable to Wemyss Bay Community Woodland Association and leave it in a sealed envelope, with your name and address in the Village News folder in Spar, or send it to Eila Roberts, 14 Brueacre Drive, Wemyss Bay. You will be very welcome to come along and help plant the bulbs.

Help us to make sure that we have a very broad selection of native wildflowers in the Woods – in this way we can encourage a large variety of insects, birds and animals, so that they too can enjoy our local greenspace.
