## David Cairns MP - 2005 AN EVENTFUL YEAR FOR INVERCLYDE

May I take this opportunity to wish everyone in Wemyss Bay a very happy Christmas and a peaceful and prosperous New Year. Throughout the year my postbag has reflected the concerns of villagers, and I know that many of you remain worried about the future of our local hospitals and schools. On the Health Service front, we are at last making progress and I feel that the move to the Greater Glasgow Health Board is the right one for us. But we cannot be complacent and I have contacted the Greater Glasgow Health Board to stress that they must not use this re-organisation as an excuse to cut services.

Schools continue to remain an issue, and I realise that many parents are particularly worried about the future of secondary education in Inverclyde. It seems to me that the Council have not listened enough to the concerns of parents and are determined to close some very good schools. I fear that this will not only have an adverse affect on children's education, but result in them having to travel longer distances to school.

Employment was a recurring theme thought the year and many people were unsettled by the job losses in the IT sector at the start of the 2005. During 2005 I have been in regular contact with Renfrewshire Enterprise about how we can attract more companies to the area, and I remain convinced that smaller home grown companies providing high skilled jobs are the way forward.

One very important way to improve Inverclyde's prospects, and relieve the pressure of house building in Wemyss Bay, is to ensure that the Waterfront Development in Greenock and Port Glasgow goes ahead. This is why I am backing the call for an Urban Re-generation company for Inverclyde as it will be able to access money and expertise to develop our Riverfront for the benefit of all.

As the year draws to a close I am optimistic about Inverclyde's future; we live in a wonderful place and have many talented and kind-hearted people in our community. And by working together, we can transform our area into a bright, modern, exciting place where people will want to come and live, work and have fun.

Indeed, if some are to be believed, it's too dangerous to even try and enjoy ourselves at Christmas. Every year there seems to

be a fresh round of scare-stories about the latest killer toy, credit card fraud, poisonous Christmas dinners, incendiary decorations etc.

I'm determined, however, not to let the doom-mongers win. After all, just as at any other time of the year, a few sensible precautions can keep you out of trouble.

Take your Christmas night out. A great chance to let your hair down, have a few drinks and settle some old scores by telling your colleagues exactly what you think of them.

## **Bulb and Wildflower Appeal**

The Woodland Association has planted over 5000 bulbs throughout Wemyss Bay Wood but, in order to help reintroduce native species this is a drop in the ocean. Again this year we are looking for your help. We are working in an area of almost 18 acres so we need a lot of bulbs and wildflowers. If you are buying bulbs for your garden why not add an extra pack or two for the woods? We are specifically looking for Native British Bluebells, Snowdrops and Wood Anemones. We have already had several hundred daffodil bulbs donated and at present do not need anymore of these.

In addition we are looking for a variety of wildflowers including Bugle, Primroses, Ragged Robin, Devil's Bit Scabious and Kidney Vetch. As it is against the law to dig up wildflowers these will all have to be purchased from specialist suppliers. We can buy these in bulk to reduce costs (we can also buy bulbs in this way). As an example 50 Wood Anemones will cost us £14 while 50 primroses will cost £28.50 and the same number of scabious £37.

If you would like to make a donation towards the cost of the bulbs and wildflowers please make a cheque payable to Wemyss Bay Community Woodland Association and leave it in a sealed envelope, with your name and address in the Village News folder in Spar, or send it to Eila Roberts, 14 Brueacre Drive, Wemyss Bay. You will be very welcome to come along and help plant the bulbs.

If you have bulbs to donate please contact Eila Tel: 529375 to arrange uplift. Again, if you would like to, you can help with the planting.

Help us to make sure that we have a very broad selection of native wildflowers in the Woods – in this way we can encourage a large variety of insects, birds and animals, so that they too can enjoy our local greenspace.

Work is continuing to clear rhododendron in the terraced garden area and over the last three months there has been a huge difference to the area as a result of the work of the volunteers. Already many native species are starting to regenerate and this is bound to continue in the coming months. Plants and trees which previously struggled for light and space now have a chance to flourish. The Association would like to thank all the volunteers who have helped over the course of this year, especially those from outwith Wemyss Bay who will not benefit directly. In particular though, thanks must go to the regular die-hards who have turned out, regardless of the weather conditions, for almost three years now. In order to give everyone a breather and allow some time for Christmas preparations, there will not be a working weekend during December. Weekends start again with a vengeance on Saturday 7th and Sunday 8th January when we would welcome volunteers, old and new, to join us to work off the excesses of Christmas. We are continuing to work in the area approaching the terraced gardens so enter through the gate in the wall on Ardgowan Road, opposite the end of Castle Wemyss Drive. We work from 9.30am – 3pm and provide all the necessary gloves, safety glasses and tools. In addition we stop for coffee/tea and biscuits in the morning and provide soup and hot sausage rolls at lunchtime. Children are welcome to come along (we do have gloves to fit) however they must be accompanied at all times by a responsible adult. If you are able to come along to any of the work days please let Eila know on 529375 in order that she can cater for the correct numbers.

With work on the first phase of the main wood completed, the Association is already considering what should be included in the second phase. It is likely that the parking / service bay which had to be shelved in phase 1 will be included along with a short family cycle path. Other possibilities are also being considered at this time and will be discussed at the Association's AGM which will be held at 7.30pm in the Community Centre on Sunday 22nd January. There will be a committee meeting in January prior to the AGM. If you have any questions or comments about the work of the Association please come along to the AGM. There will be an opportunity to ask questions, and proposals for the next phase will be discussed. Don't worry, you will not be roped into serving on the committee unless you really would like to – we have a number of people willing to continue, although fresh faces and new ideas would be very welcome. On top of this we have currently sold over 60 numbers in support of next year's 50/50 club. This fundraiser is specifically to support the Jubilee Garden upkeep and 50% of sales is ploughed straight back into the garden with the other 50% being issued in prize money over the year. The more members we have, the bigger the prize fund. Some numbers are still available - contact the school for details.

## **Greenlight**

Greenlight will continue their regular kerbside collections for residents of flats, with an uplift on Mondays 12th December. So far we have been unable to confirm their dates for 2006 but hope to bring these in the next Village News.
