Christmas Lights Switch-On

Did all your Christmas wishes come true? Members of the Community Association were wishing that the centre had expanding walls as everyone piled into the building after the lights switch-on last month.

For the first time there was a mini Christmas market outside the centre with some of the community organisations running stalls under decorated gazebos and lit by fairy-lights. Santa's grotto was also outside and looked beautiful with all its Christmas decorations.

Santa was extremely busy and distributed over 200 gifts to the hordes of excited children, while the adults managed to work their way through almost 150 mince pies, 300 pieces of shortbread and 75 litres of mulled wine!! Although it was a bit of a squeeze to fit everyone in at times, we hope you all had a good time. Thank you to everyone who came along and made the night so successful.

We know that some people think that the council put much more effort into things this year, so we thought it important to clarify who did what. Inverclyde Council provided the Christmas tree and lights outside the school and were responsible for actually switching the lights on. In addition they provided tea, coffee and some of the mince pies for the adults and some of the juice and crisps for the kids inside the community centre. All the decorations inside the community centre were provided by the Community Association, with volunteers starting at 9.00am that morning to decorate the hall. The mulled wine, which was served by local volunteers, extra mince pies, shortbread and additional juice and crisps for the children were provided by the Association. Finally all the presents which Santa handed out were funded by the Community Association. Special thanks must be given to Kirsty Donnelly, chairperson of the Community Association, and her willing (!) band of volunteers for all their efforts in insuring that this was the best Lights Switch-On yet.

Bulb and Wildflower Appeal

The Woodland Association has planted over 5000 bulbs throughout Wemyss Bay Wood but, in order to help reintroduce native species this is a drop in the ocean. Again this year we are looking for your help. We are working in an area of almost 18 acres so we need a lot of bulbs and wildflowers. If you are buying bulbs for your garden why not add an extra pack or two for the woods? We are specifically looking for Native British Bluebells, Snowdrops and Wood Anemones. We have already had several hundred daffodil bulbs donated and at present do not need anymore of these.

In addition we are looking for a variety of wildflowers including Bugle, Primroses, Ragged Robin, Devil's Bit Scabious and Kidney Vetch. As it is against the law to dig up wildflowers these will all have to be purchased from specialist suppliers. We can buy these in bulk to reduce costs (we can also buy bulbs in this way). As an example 50 Wood Anemones will cost us £14 while 50 primroses will cost £28.50 and the same number of scabious £37.

If you would like to make a donation towards the cost of the bulbs and wildflowers please make a cheque payable to Wemyss Bay Community Woodland Association and leave it in a sealed envelope, with your name and address in the Village News folder in Spar, or send it to Eila Roberts, 14 Brueacre Drive, Wemyss Bay. You will be very welcome to come along and help plant the bulbs.

Help us to make sure that we have a very broad selection of native wildflowers in the Woods – in this way we can encourage a large variety of insects, birds and animals, so that they too can enjoy our local greenspace.

David Cairns MP - 2006: INVERCLYDE'S YEAR FOR CHANGE

2006 is a key year for Inverclyde. There are a number of changes taking place this year, and I believe that if we embrace these initiatives and take them forward, we will bring about massive improvements to Inverclyde.

As I have said in previous articles, I am certain that the regeneration of the Waterfront is vital to unlocking our potential and we have a once in a lifetime opportunity to bring about huge change in Inverclyde. But this will not be easy and it requires careful planning, which is why I want to see an Urban Regeneration Company set up. These public private partnerships have proved successful in other parts of the country and can access millions of pounds worth of investment and transform entire areas of Inverclyde.

What we need are good quality well planned developments from Port Glasgow right down to Gourock. Smart new housing along our waterfront will help to ease the pressure of house building in Wemyss Bay, and the leisure and business facilities built into these developments will benefit everyone.

But it is not just our Riverfront which is changing. We can already see changes taking place in our local schools and, while I welcome the extra money that the Scottish Executive is putting into education, I have some real concerns about how Inverclyde Council is responding to the challenges. Unless we listen to what parents in Wemyss Bay want for their children, we will never be able to provide adequate primary and secondary schooling for our young villagers.

Council tenants too are facing change this autumn when they will be asked to vote on transferring to Riverclyde Homes, a not for profit housing organisation. And although there is very little council housing in Wemyss Bay, I realize that many of you will have relatives and friends who are Inverclyde Council tenants. This is an exciting opportunity for them, and by transferring to community ownership they will unlock millions of pounds of investment to upgrade their existing houses and build new ones. New improved housing will transform the local landscape in some of our most deprived areas and help with the overall regeneration of Inverclyde.

2006 is a year of opportunity and, if we grasp that opportunity, our whole community will benefit.

Duncan McNeil MSP

Well that's that over for another year.

The turkey's eaten, the decorations are down and you're trying your best to stick to your New Year's Resolutions – if only as a means of paying off your credit card bills.

And, thrown to the back of drawers, cupboards, or (if you've got absolutely no shame) the small ads, are the gifts in which you've already lost interest.

What, though, if it's not musical socks or an ironing board cover with which you're bored? What if it's a pet?

Despite all the warnings and information campaigns, some people still hastily ask for –and give – pets as presents. And, when the novelty wears off, they're just as quick to try and offload them.

While we might profess to be a nation of animal lovers, this sort of selfish attitude underlines the need to have robust animal protection legislation in place. In 2006, therefore, the Scottish Parliament will be pressing ahead with the Animal Health and Welfare (Scotland) Bill.

A piece of legislation which people from Wemyss Bay concerned about animal welfare helped to shape at the consultation stage, the Bill will bring animal welfare legislation into the 21st century.

It will consolidate, modernise and strengthen the law and provide proportionate and enforceable sanctions against animal cruelty and neglect. A duty of care on animal keepers is also set to be introduced, as is a general prohibition on mutilations and stronger laws against animal fighting. And, to allow animals to be taken to a place of safety before they start to suffer, inspectors will have increased powers of entry.

Pets are not just fashion accessories or toys, there for us to lift and lay as we please. And we are responsible for more than just avoiding being cruel to them. We have, as this Bill will enshrine in law, a duty to care for our animals too.

Woodland Association

Work is continuing to clear rhododendron in the terraced garden area and over the last three months there has been a huge difference to the area as a result of the work of the volunteers. Already many native species are starting to regenerate and this is bound to continue in the coming months. Plants and trees which previously struggled for light and space now have a chance to flourish.

Weekends start again with a vengeance on Saturday 7th and Sunday 8th January when we would welcome volunteers, old and new, to join us to work off the excesses of Christmas. We are continuing to work in the area approaching the terraced gardens so enter through the gate in the wall on Ardgowan Road, opposite the end of Castle Wemyss Drive. We work from 9.30am – 3pm and provide all the necessary gloves, safety glasses and tools. In addition we stop for coffee/tea and biscuits in the morning and provide soup and hot sausage rolls at lunchtime. Waste collection

Your blue and brown recycling bins should be collected, on your normal collection day, during the weeks beginning 5th & 19th December and 2nd & 16th January. This means that your residual black bin should be emptied, on your normal collection day, during the weeks beginning 12th & 26th December and 9th & 23rd January.

Greenlight

It is our understanding that the Greenlight doorstep collection of recyclables to residents of flats and tenements is to stop. You should have received notification directly of the last collection day. Even without a doorstep collection you can still get involved in recycling. There is a bottle bank at the Community Centre. At Londis at Inverkip, along with many of the supermarkets, there are bottle, paper and clothes banks. Please try to continue to recycle and do your bit for the environment.

Councillor Eric Forbes

Welcome to 2006. I hope everyone enjoyed a happy, restful and pleasant Festive Season. It will be a year of many challenges but also of future successes.

On a local basis we have to look forward to the refurbishment of the Primary School and I know for a fact, as I have been a party to some of them, that serious talks have taken place with the Head Teacher, staff, parents and the School Board. There are concerns but I am confident that they will be addressed in the appropriate manner taking all views into account. It is not an easy exercise, but necessary, to give our schoolchildren a modern fit for purpose environment and to address the issues that have been neglected in the past. The question of the best place for nursery provision is being properly debated and discussed. The Officers will continue to have dialogue and paramount are the children, their welfare and educational needs during the transformation. No final decisions have been taken. Thanks for everyone's perseverance.

On the question of the Council's Schools Business Plan which is obviously of interest to some parents in Wemyss Bay: We are still awaiting (at the time of going to press) a decision from the Education Minister after in one part of the plan (Primary Schools) there is a period of 2 years and in the Secondary part a time of 10 months. This means that timescales have to be re-visited and extra finance has to be sought as prices increase. However this has not prevented us from moving ahead with our refurbishment and new build on the schools under prudential borrowing. We can see the difference this is making and will make in the future to our schools' environment and how it is the right course of action after years of inattention and neglect of our school estate.

In relation to our new build Secondary School at Ravenscraig Pitches which is also of interest to some Wemyss Bay parents: A presentation took place in Greenock High School where the architect explained the new design, the concept behind it and then answered questions from the audience of about 100 people. What is on the table after many hours of consultation is a modern, efficient, fit for purpose, 21st century school. Thanks go to the designers, Officers, staff, parents and School Board members who took part in the consultations.

Inverclyde will be a better place with the Waterfront regeneration programme and hopefully we will hear very soon from the Communities Minister that we have gained Urban Regeneration Company status (we had not heard at time of going to press). This is down to a lot of hard work by our Officers and the desire of the Council in partnership with Renfrewshire Enterprise to bring this to fruition timeously and open up a funding stream of millions of pounds. An excellent opportunity for the whole of Inverclyde.

Back to a village issue; you may have noticed that the 30mph speed restriction has been moved further eastwards and hopefully this will assist in eradicating accidents on this stretch of the road. We cannot legislate for bad driving and I would ask drivers to always drive according to the prevailing road conditions.

Record Breaking Paper Chain

In an effort to get into the Guinness Book of Records, P7 at Wemyss Bay Primary School have been making a very long paper chain. As part of their enterprise project the busy pupils have sold over 8,400 strips of paper and so far their chain has reached a massive 200 metres. In the few weeks up until Christmas the class has involved the entire school and so far has raised over £400. All the money raised will go to Oxfam's Unwrapped Christmas Appeal and will be used to buy donkeys, goats and a beehive in Africa and other under-developed countries.

Oxfam Unwrapped is a Christmas Appeal aimed at raising awareness of the human suffering in Africa and other third world countries and is also campaigning for an end to poverty. For only £24 you can buy a goat, which immediately provides fertiliser for crops, 12 pints of milk a week and eventually meat. When your goat produces its first female kid this is passed on to another family and ensuring that the help goes on. Donkeys are vital in many remote locations where it may be many miles to the nearest water hole – a donation of £50 can provide a donkey. Toilets, taps, training for teachers and midwives, fishing nets,

tools for a farmer, beehives, essential medicines for a village and many more essential items are available by logging on to Oxfam Unwrapped or by popping in to your nearest Oxfam store. Instead of popping sweets into someone's stocking this year why not follow the example set by the pupils of Wemyss Bay Primary School - £6 will provide 100 school dinners. Surely the Christmas message is about hope and by supporting Oxfam Unwrapped this year you can bring hope to some of the world's poorest people. Let the children of Wemyss Bay show the rest of us the way.
