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## Woodland Association

During the first three weeks of March a consultation, commissioned by Inverclyde Council, will take place on the future of the woods. This will culminate in a public meeting in the school on Tuesday 21st March. Further on in the Village News there is an article from Alistair Hackston, one of the consultants, explaining what will happen. There is also a questionnaire enclosed with this edition. (If you have not received a questionnaire please phone Eila on 529375.)

Wemyss Bay Wood is designated in Inverclyde Council's Local Plan for the next ten years as a greenspace, however local plans have been changed before now and, even if it is not, there is no guarantee what will happen then. How many parks and woodland do you know that have been sold off for housing or other uses? Do you care whether this happens here? Do you want your children to have somewhere to play in the future?

The Woodland Association would like to see Wemyss Bay Woods and the Terraced Garden area protected as a community greenspace for the future; however this lies completely in your hands. It is for you to decide what, if anything, should happen now. The Association urges you to complete the enclosed questionnaire and return it, by the closing date, to the Village News folder in Spar.

Even if you do not want anything more to be done in the woods but to have them maintained as they are, please fill in the questionnaire and make your opinion count. The Woodland Association has already had suggestions that include a cycle track, a fitness/activity circuit and play equipment for youngsters but it is up to you whether any of this will come to pass.

In relation to the Terraced Gardens, the Association's AGM suggested that a programme of conservation and limited restoration would be the most appropriate course of action, with repairs to the base of the Victorian fernery and cliff walls, continued clearance of rhododendron, a limited planting of low-maintenance and woodland plants, and the siting of benches at appropriate view-points. Again, it is up to you whether any of this should happen.

If you have not yet visited the gardens and would like to do so, prior to giving an opinion on their future, the Woodland Association is working in the area on Sat 4th & Sun 5th March when representatives of the Association will be happy to give a guided tour along with some of the historical information.

The Association will be conducting Guided Walks of the Wood and the Terraced Garden area during the consultation process on Friday 10th March at 2pm, Saturday 11th and Sunday 12th March at 11am and 2pm. Prior to making your decision on the future of the wood why not come along on a walk and find out more about some of the areas' wildlife and history.

Unless there is a good response to the questionnaire, the council at some point will take the view that there is little interest in retaining the wood for the community. In order to ensure the future of the wood as a greenspace it is vital that as many forms as possible are returned. Another way of showing support for Wemyss Bay Wood is to join the Woodland Association, whose primary aim is to protect the wood as a community resource.

You will see that on Tuesday 21st March, from 7 – 9 pm, at the school, there will be a "Woodland Future" workshop. Unless there is a good turnout at the meeting and through the questionnaires we will be asking, "Does the woodland have a future?" Please, please complete the questionnaire. Please, please attend the meeting. The future of Wemyss Bay Wood is in your hands.....

## Ardgowan Hospice Lottery

Did you know that in an average week at Ardgowan Hospice 8 patients, their relatives and carers receive care in the In-Patient Unit; 50 patients attend the Day Hospice; Community Macmillan Nurses visit 30 patients in their own homes; Volunteer Drivers transport up to 80 patients and 10 patients receive special Lymph oedema treatment. The hospice also provides a non-denominational chaplaincy service for patients, relatives and staff; education for professionals caring for those living with cancer; an equipment loan service and bereavement support for relatives.

Such was the demand for services that the original building at 12 Nelson Street became overcrowded, requiring the construction of a new building at 2 Ardgowan Street, Greenock.

The Ardgowan Hospice lottery is one way in which the local community can help raise funds necessary to continue the work of the hospice.

There are a few ways in which you can join the lottery:

1. By Direct Debit for £4 every four weeks.
2. By cheque or postal order every 3 months, six months or yearly.
3. By an Ardgowan Hospice Collector coming to your home every 4 weeks to collect £4
4. By posting an envelope containing £4 through your collector's door prior to the collection date.

## David Cairns MP: Inverclyde's Fairtrade Fortnight

Fairtrade is all about ensuring that workers and farmers in the developing world are paid a decent price for what they produce, and making certain that they have equal access to the world's markets. Once a year there is a national Fairtrade Fortnight, aimed at showing people how just a small change in their shopping habits can make a real difference to poverty in the developing world.

**Fairtrade Fortnight runs from 6th-19th March** this year and there are lots of things happening throughout Inverclyde.

Members of Inverclyde's Fairtrade Steering Group have been hard at work arranging a number of events in the area, and many local schools and churches will be selling Fairtrade produce during the two week period. There will also be a **stall in the Oak Mall on 9th-10th March** and another at the **Farmers' Market in Greenock on 18th March**. Why not go along and show your support for farmers and producers in the developing world and buy at least one Fairtrade item during Fairtrade fortnight?

There are an increasing number of Fairtrade products available in the larger stores in Greenock such as Tesco, Marks and Spencer and Morrison's. You can buy everything from fruit to tea to chocolate and there are even Fairtrade wines and footballs available locally. Greenock now has its own Fairtrade shop called 'Fayre' at 7 Newton Street and they stock a wide range of products at very reasonable prices. You can make a real difference to farmers and workers in the developing world by including just one or two Fairtrade items in your weekly shop. Watch out for goods with the distinctive blue and green Fairtrade logo that guarantees fair play for people in the developing world.

And while we can all do our bit for Fairtrade locally by changing our shopping habits, at an international level we need to make sure that poorer countries are not discriminated against by global rules on trade. ## Your View To Help "See The Wood For The Trees"

You may know that right on your doorstep is a large area of mature woodland, owned by Inverclyde Council. Over the last 4 years, the team from Lower Clyde Greenspace has supported local volunteers from the Wemyss Bay Community Woodland Association who have been clearing the ground cover in the woodland of "alien" species of plants. In the main wood, site work has opened up the woodland floor to native species, has made it more pleasant and safe to use by building new paths. What else do you think we might do in this main woodland area? Improve for wildlife? Encourage more active use?

In a separate part of the site, the project has uncovered the remains of garden terraces and structures built between 1860 and 1888. We would like your view on how much more we should do on this site, which would be sympathetic to its "garden history".

Through Lower Clyde Greenspace, Inverclyde Council is looking to explore a wide cross-section of the local opinion about how much more to do in these two areas. The survey is being coordinated by Alistair Hackston of Projectsplus Consultants and a questionnaire is attached to this newsletter. Please look at this and fill it in.

What we ask you to do is:

- **Come and have a look around the woods and the terraced gardens.** The Woodland Association will provide guided walks of the area on Friday 10th March at 2pm; and on both Saturday 11th and Sunday 12th, at 11am and again at 2pm. Meet for all of these at the main entrance to the wood off Ardgowan Road.
- **Fill in and return the questionnaire** to the village news folder at the Spar shop by Friday 17th March. There will also be some consultancy researchers (with usual pen and clipboard) in various places around the village and close to the wood on 11th and 12th March to speak to those who prefer to respond directly.
- **Encourage your children's imagination.** We want some younger opinions in the form of drawings. We would like to ask the 5-11 year olds to imagine what they would like to see or to do in these areas and draw a picture on a theme of "What would be good in the wood". Two particularly good drawings will receive a prize of art materials to help extend young artistic talent further.
- **Come and talk to us.** The consultants will hold a "Woodland Future" workshop in Wemyss Bay Primary School on Tuesday 21st March between 7.00 pm and 9.00 pm. We will present survey results and would like to discuss your views on the types of work you would like to see being undertaken in these areas.
- **Let us thank you.** At the meeting, by way of a "thank you", we will have a draw (from the returned questionnaires) for 3 separate prizes of vouchers for the Spar shop (£15; £10; and £5) AND, will present a prize of art materials for the most interesting production by two junior artists as mentioned above. (approx £10 – 15 each)

## Let Changes

The cost of hiring the Community Centre has remained the same for a number of years. It has become necessary to review these costs and, with effect from April, the cost of hiring the centre will be £5 per hour for community groups and £10 per hour for commercial lets.

## Waste collection

## Is This Your Child?

I had some visitors on Thursday 9th February. They come and visit me often; in fact they must like me a lot because some evenings they can visit me up to 4 times.

Who are they? A group of young boys aged around 10-12 years, who like to hang around in Wemyss Bay wood.

When I was wee, we used to play ring, bang, scoosh, when we rang someone's doorbell and then ran away. They don't do that, they smash against my front door so that it sounds as if they are going to smash it in, and then they run off into the woods laughing hysterically.

As you can imagine, it makes me rather cross. I know why all the work was done in the woods, however it has made the lives of some of us who live at the edge of the woods quite miserable as the children can get up to nonsense and escape into the woods much more easily than they could before.

However that Thursday (the school holiday) was a bit different. On the Monday I was rather dramatically rushed to hospital in an ambulance. Home again but still very unwell and with balance problems due to medication I was resting in the house, when my visitors arrived, smashed at my front door, and as you can imagine gave me a terrible fright. I automatically tried to jump out of my chair but lost my balance and fell over. While I was lying on the floor they were probably running into the woods laughing. These children obviously have no thought to what the consequences of their actions could be. Maybe you should ask your son what he was doing the Thursday night of the school holidays, because I **will** get the names of the boys involved, and when I do I **will** be speaking to the police as this has now become a public nuisance, and if its your son I **will** be calling round at your door, not to smash it, but to knock it and try to explain to you how miserable your son has been making my life. No-one should have to sit in their own home worrying about young thugs trying to break their door.

## Councillor Eric Forbes

Over the next few months a feasibility study will take place into the parking situation at Wemyss Bay pierhead with the report being completed by 30 June 2005. The study will take into account the possibility of infilling the foreshore area between the present Cal-Mac parking and Beech House. It will be a thorough report and will consider all the conditions prevailing at Wemyss Bay pier area at the moment.

In a recent article in the "Largs and Millport Weekly News" that referred to a new traffic management for Largs town centre reference was made to residents' parking permits. I made enquiries with the Transportation Manager for North Ayrshire Council and learned that the areas being considered for such permits did not include the A78 (Trunk Road) through Largs. He was quite adamant that even if the road was a Council road it would not be part of any parking permit scheme as it not only serves house but also businesses. This is a similar situation to Wemyss Bay.

By the time the Newsletter will be produced I will have carried out an inspection of the A78 Trunk Road from Port Glasgow to Wemyss Bay with senior officials of Amey Highways. This inspection will allow me to highlight with them the several issues raised with me regarding the trunk road as it makes its way through Wemyss Bay.

Decisions regarding the refurbishment of the Primary school are still being formulated and will be relayed for discussion at a later time to all interested parties.

## Duncan McNeil MSP

It's been much discussed and argued over. But now it's finally about to happen.

From the 26th of this month, the ban on smoking in public places will come into effect. What this means is that, from 6am that morning, smoking in any "wholly or substantially enclosed" public place will be prohibited. This, as you'll doubtless be aware from the media coverage, includes pubs and restaurants. But it also applies to offices and factories – including designated smoking rooms – shops, clubs and more. The lawyers have had a field day drafting the precise legal definition, but, as a rough rule, any room not in someone's home (or a *de facto* home, such as an adult hospice) will be non-smoking.

The biggest winners under the ban will be the bar and waiting staff who will no longer need to work their shifts in a polluted environment. Having campaigned for employees' rights all of my working life, it's a step forward that we no longer regard staff in the hospitality industry as somehow exempt from the protection everyone else takes for granted.

And, if the ban helps change our behaviour, we can all look forward to reaping the benefits of a healthier Scotland.

The smoking ban on its own, however, cannot achieve this. It must go hand-in-hand with good quality, accessible smoking cessation services which work hard to engage with those who are not normally reached by health promotion campaigns. We can't fall into the trap of sweeping the problem under the carpet – simply moving smokers from the lounge bar to their lounge at home, surrounded by their children.

Also, we must stop the next generation picking up the suicidal habit in the first place. And my bid to raise the minimum purchasing age for tobacco from 16 to 18 can, as evidence from elsewhere shows, help towards this. I am continuing to press the case for this and Ministers will, before long, need to decide whether they will use their new powers to make the move.

## Bulb and Wildflower Appeal

The Woodland Association has planted over 5000 bulbs throughout Wemyss Bay Wood but, in order to help reintroduce native species this is a drop in the ocean. Again this year we are looking for your help. We are working in an area of almost 18 acres so we need a lot of bulbs and wildflowers. If you are buying bulbs for your garden why not add an extra pack or two for the woods? We are specifically looking for Native British Bluebells, Snowdrops and Wood Anemones. We have already had several hundred daffodil bulbs donated and at present do not need anymore of these.

In addition we are looking for a variety of wildflowers including Bugle, Primroses, Ragged Robin, Devil's Bit Scabious and Kidney Vetch. As it is against the law to dig up wildflowers these will all have to be purchased from specialist suppliers. We can buy these in bulk to reduce costs (we can also buy bulbs in this way). As an example 50 Wood Anemones will cost us £14 while 50 primroses will cost £28.50 and the same number of scabious £37.

If you would like to make a donation towards the cost of the bulbs and wildflowers please make a cheque payable to Wemyss Bay Community Woodland Association and leave it in a sealed envelope, with your name and address in the Village News folder in Spar, or send it to Eila Roberts, 14 Brueacre Drive, Wemyss Bay. You will be very welcome to come along and help plant the bulbs.

Help us to make sure that we have a very broad selection of native wildflowers in the Woods – in this way we can encourage a large variety of insects, birds and animals, so that they too can enjoy our local greenspace.
