In November last year we performed 2 One Act Plays instead of It Runs In the Family. Ray Cooney's farce "It Runs in the Family" is set in the doctors' common room of St. Andrews Hospital. It's 10:45 a.m., three days before Christmas. Dr. David Mortimore sits polishing the most important speech of his life - a speech he will deliver at noon before 200 distinguished colleagues, a speech which will surely earn him prestige and promotion and probably a Knighthood. David Cairns MP: Inverclyde Benefits from Criminals' Cash

Inverclyde is set to gain £250,000 seized from the ill-gotten gains of major criminals, thanks the Proceeds of Crime Act. This Act is a good example of what can be achieved when the UK and Scottish Parliaments work closely together, to tackle the major problems experienced by our communities. The UK legislation enables the Scottish Parliament to seize assets, which criminals can't account for, and distribute the money to areas suffering from high crime rates. And this is exactly what the Scottish Executive Justice Minister, Cathy Jamieson MSP, has done.

The days when the 'Mr Bigs' of crime could prey on our communities, while living in large houses and driving nice cars are gone. They can no longer distance themselves from the criminals acting on their behalf, and if they can't show that they have acquired their assets legally – they will be seized and put to good use helping the communities they tried to ruin. The message to any up and coming criminals in Inverclyde is simple; crime doesn't pay.

The £250,000 coming to Inverclyde is part of the £2million confiscated from drug dealers and other criminals throughout Scotland. It will be used to fund activities for youngsters to help keep them off the streets and make sure they don't take that first step along the road to a life of crime. Although no final decision on how to spend the money has been taken, top priorities are likely to include after hours clubs at schools, sports activities and youth work targeted at those thought most at risk of offending.

We all know that much of the crime in Inverclyde is drug related. Addicts break into homes, steal cars and even mug people in the street to feed their habit. Low level street dealers sell their poison to our children all over Inverclyde and, while it is important to catch these people, it is not enough. We need to target the crime barons behind them and confiscate the huge profits they are making from their criminal empires. The Proceeds of Crime Act helps us do this, so Inverclyde's major criminals better watch out – not only are you going to jail, but there will be no cushy lifestyle waiting for you when you get out.

Councillor Eric Forbes

I am still dealing with village issues such as road repairs, litter-picking and others. However, I am going to change the direction of my article this month and introduce a topic that is of interest Inverclyde wide.

I refer to the visit of not just one but three Scottish Ministers namely Jack McConnell, Nicol Stephen and Malcolm Chiscolm to Inverclyde on 28 February 2006 to make a regeneration statement regarding the granting of "URBAN REGENERATION COMPANY (URC)" status to Inverclyde's Riverside Inverclyde initiative. Glasgow and Irvine Bay were also granted similar status.

What does this mean?

Well, a partnership with Scottish Enterprise Renfrewshire has been formed and this is to facilitate a 10 year masterplan being drawn up to develop the Waterfront / A8 corridor from Broadfield in the east to Campbell in the west.

Riverside Inverclyde addresses important issues such as population decline, the remediation of land, the development of key sites and most important the improvement of Inverclyde's image.

The development framework identified a public sector partnership that could deliver up to £94 million worth of projects within the initiative area and these in turn have the potential to attract £340 million of private sector investment.

Such investment will bring much needed employment to Inverclyde and it takes on a more important role in view of recent job losses in the area.

It is obvious that by showing Inverclyde in a more positive light and looking to the future investment will be encouraged, people will want to come to this area, jobs will be created and consequently the quality of life for us all will benefit in some shape or form.

Riverside Inverclyde is a massive plus for this area and all those involved in getting us to this stage have to be congratulated and with the commitment of the Council now and in the future then success will follow.

After years of the words “unlucky” and “Scotland” being seemingly inextricable when describing almost any international sporting contest, our half-decent performance at the Commonwealth Games certainly made a refreshing change.

And our representatives should also get an extra medal for helping to dispel the image of Scotland as a nation of pie-scoffing, beer-guzzling, fag-smoking couch potatoes. But, while the best of Scotland might have been showcased in Melbourne, we can't deny that too many Scots, especially here in the west, still conform to this unhealthy stereotype.

Just think, then, what a successful Glasgow bid for the 2014 Games could do for us.

Getting local young people fully involved in the Games, and making it easy for them to go along and see the various athletes in competition could make the Games the ideal springboard for them to get serious about their sport. It might also help people who have been inactive for a while take some exercise again, with all the health benefits that entails.

And it wouldn't do our bank balance any harm either.

Sports Minister, Patricia Ferguson, has stated that the whole country could share the social and economic benefits of a Glasgow Games and Inverclyde would be well-placed to benefit.

We would, for a start, be an ideal base for visiting sports fans. It would be a great benefit to our economy – not just during the Games themselves, but in subsequent years as Commonwealth fans returned to see our breath-taking scenery, or enjoy our hospitality, or trace their genealogy, or play one of our three golf courses.

If we can send a message that the whole of Scotland – not just Glasgow – backs this bid, we stand a better chance of winning and reaping the benefits. And that's why I'm urging everyone in Inverclyde to back Glasgow to win gold.

Woodland Association

The Association would like to thank everyone who took the trouble to complete the council's recent questionnaire regarding the future of the woods. The results, which showed a massive support of the work done by the Association, along with the desire for future improvements to both the wood and the terraced garden area, mean that the council really has something to think about. The Association will continue to work with Lower Clyde Greenspace and Inverclyde Council to pursue the wishes of the community.

The Woodland Association's next working weekend will take place at Easter Weekend, Saturday 15th and Sunday 16th April.

We are continuing to work in the area approaching the terraced gardens so enter through the gate in the wall on Ardgowan Road, opposite the end of Castle Wemyss Drive. We work from 9.30am – 3pm and provide all the necessary gloves, safety glasses and tools. In addition we stop for coffee/tea and biscuits in the morning and provide soup and hot sausage rolls at lunchtime. Children are welcome to come along (we do have gloves to fit) however they **must** be accompanied at all times by a responsible adult. If you have not yet visited the terraced gardens and would like a guided tour giving some of the history of the area, this is an ideal time to come along as members of the association will be available to help you.

The following working weekend will take place on Saturday 29th and Sunday 30th April. The usual arrangement, as above, will apply.

The Association has a number of bush-saws, bush-hooks and loppers which are available to hire, for a reasonable cost. Woodland Future Consultation

The questionnaire distributed in last month's Village News generated over 140 replies which is around 14% of the households in Wemyss Bay. The consultant, engaged by the council, will now draw up a report for submission to the council. This report will be available for public scrutiny.
