## From Our Community to the Third World

Once again, the Christmas Lights Switch-On Night was a great success, with over 500 people turning out to enjoy the carol singing before coming to the community centre for mulled wine and mince pies. Santa distributed around 175 presents to the pre-5s and primary age children and a clown provided entertainment. Following a number of requests last year to make donations, the Community Association decided to place donation buckets around the centre. £178 was collected and it was agreed to send the money to the Oxfam Unwrapped Christmas Appeal for third world countries. Your donations have purchased a tool kit for farmers, water for a farm for 6 months, the planting of 50 trees, training and equipment for a teacher and 2 goats. All of these items were chosen because they provide ongoing support and assistance to communities much less fortunate to our own. At this time of year, when we have so much, it is appropriate to turn our thoughts to other communities suffering from poverty, starvation and destitution. Thank you to the school catering staff who kindly allowed us to borrow pots large enough to make the mulled wine. The Community Association committee and numerous other volunteer spent many hours decorating the centre, making all the arrangements and working on the night and their efforts are greatly appreciated. To all the community organisations who participated, thank you, you really add to the enjoyment and atmosphere of the night. Finally, a huge thank you must go to Santa for taking time out from his very busy schedule to spend several hours meeting all the youngsters.

## Skelmorlie and Wemyss Bay Parish Church

Happy New Year! I hope 2007 proves to be a healthy and fulfilling year for you.

It seems to me that the turn of the year is not celebrated as widely as it used to be. Nowadays Christmas is the main event: "Christmas is for the children" – or so many maintain; and from my point of view that should be an encouraging trend. The celebration of the coming of Jesus is central to Christian Gospel; but the turn of the year also has its significance, particularly in Scotland.

Not so many years ago, Watchnight Services were held on New Year's Eve, not Christmas Eve. Christmas Day was not an official holiday in Scotland until the 1960's, whereas New Year's Day was. First footing was expected in the village where I grew up. A light in any window was an open invitation to anybody who cared to call; and visitors usually carried a lump of coal – for warmth throughout the year; a piece of black bun – for food in the cupboard; and the customary dram – presumably for conviviality; these are numbered among the many symbols and superstitions of New Year celebrations, customs that have more or less died out. I notice too that *Old Moore's Almanac*, an astrological look ahead, is still around, and some will dabble in its pages in the hope of foretelling a rosy future for themselves.

Resolutions also used to be made at the beginning of a New Year; this provided an opportunity to start with a clean slate, to put right any personal wrongs in the past year – relationships that can be repaired, perhaps, or letting go of something that has troubled you throughout 2006.

As you take your first tentative steps into this New Year may you find release from the past by letting the light of Christ lead you into a more hopeful future.

## Woodland Association

The Woodland Association would like to thank everyone who took part in our Treasure Hunt at the Lights Switch-On, helping us to raise £40. The winner of the musical reindeer was Andrew Wilson.

Our first working weekend of 2007 will take place on Saturday 6th & Sunday 7th January giving everyone a chance to work off the excesses of the Christmas festivities. We are continuing to work in the area adjoining Ardgowan Road heading up to the point at the end of Cliff Terrace Road so meet at the Ardgowan Road of Cliff Terrace Road. We work from 9.30am – 3pm and provide all the necessary gloves, safety glasses and tools. In addition we stop for coffee/tea and biscuits in the morning and provide hot sausage rolls and soup at lunchtime. We have a qualified first aider present at all times (although thankfully, so far, the worst we have had to deal with is the odd scratch, minor cut or midge bites). Children are welcome to come along (we do have gloves to fit) however they must be accompanied at all times by a responsible adult. We have a small, but dedicated, band of volunteers but it would really make a difference to our work if a few more people were to join us, even for an hour or two.

Membership of the Association runs from January till December and we welcome new members. It costs £3 for a family membership or £2 for individuals. Membership money helps towards our insurance and day to day running costs.

The Woodland Association has planted over 5000 bulbs throughout Wemyss Bay Wood but, in order to help reintroduce native species this is a drop in the ocean. Again this year we are looking for your help. We are working in an area of almost 18 acres so we need a lot of bulbs and wildflowers. If you are buying bulbs for your garden why not add an extra pack or two for the woods? We are specifically looking for Native British Bluebells, Snowdrops and Wood Anemones. We have already had several hundred daffodil bulbs donated and at present do not need anymore of these.

In addition we are looking for a variety of wildflowers including Bugle, Primroses, Ragged Robin, Devil's Bit Scabious and Kidney Vetch. As it is against the law to dig up wildflowers these will all have to be purchased from specialist suppliers. We can buy these in bulk to reduce costs (we can also buy bulbs in this way). As an example 50 Wood Anemones will cost us £14 while 50 primroses will cost £28.50 and the same number of scabious £37.

We would like to thank everyone who have already made personal donations towards the Bulb Fund, in addition to the Community Association and Adult Association for their contributions. We have recently placed an order for around £400 of bulbs and wildflowers but still require a great deal more.

If you would like to make a donation towards the cost of the bulbs and wildflowers please make a cheque payable to Wemyss Bay Community Woodland Association and leave it in a sealed envelope, with your name and address in the Village News folder in Spar, or send it to Eila Roberts, 14 Brueacre Drive, Wemyss Bay. Help us to make sure that we have a very broad selection of native wildflowers in the Woods – in this way we can encourage a large variety of insects, birds and animals, so that they too can enjoy our local greenspace.

## Duncan McNeil MSP

The decorations have come down, your waist has gone out and your credit card bills have gone through the roof. It must be the New Year.

The one thing to which your mind turns at this time of year (apart from pies, puddings and all the other food you can't have thanks to the two lettuce leaves and mineral water diet you foolishly promised to go on) is what the twelve months ahead hold for you.

For MSPs and Councillors, the most obvious highlight of 2007 will be the elections to the Scottish Parliament and Inverclyde Council.

But, before MSPs can even think about the fun and games of the election trail, there's a heavy legislative programme to get through.

We have the Custodial Sentences and Weapons (Scotland) Bill, which will end the current crazy system of automatic and often unconditional early release for prisoners. It will also impose new curbs on the sale of non-domestic knives, including a ban on the general sale of swords.

We will also be pressing hard to get the Bill to allow mesothelioma sufferers to claim full compensation and their families to claim for their own grief and suffering passed before Parliament is dissolved on 3rd April. This Bill will end the scandalous situation whereby sufferers of this horrible asbestos-related cancer face the distressing dilemma of either settling their damages claim while alive, or not settling their claim before death so that their relatives can claim a greater award. Most sufferers do not claim themselves so as not to disadvantage their families – an invidious position in which too many people in former heavy industrial communities like ours find themselves.

To help tackle child obesity, the Schools (Health Promotion and Nutrition) (Scotland) Bill is also set to be completed. This will require schools to be "health promoting" and will enable Ministers to lay down statutory nutritional standards.

2007 will also see that rarest of beasts: a consultation on a health board plan for our hospital which is actually good news.

From now until 2nd February, you can register your views on the health board's proposals to secure Accident and Emergency services at Inverclyde Royal Hospital and to safeguard inpatient services such as trauma, orthopaedics and general surgery. It is important that the board is in no doubt that our community backs these plans and I would therefore urge you to get in touch with them to register your support.

## Dog Fouling

Discovering you have stood in dog dirt is really annoying. What is worse is that there is evidence of repeated eye infections for years as a result of people not cleaning up after their pet.

That is a real situation highlighted by Inverclyde Council staff who, since April, have been making irresponsible dog owners pay up – issuing £40 fixed penalty notices for each offence.

It is an offence not to clean up after your dog in all public open spaces including parks, footpaths, beaches and even common backcourts. Legislation has been in place for the last two years giving local authorities powers to fine those responsible for dogs leaving mess. Up until now owners have paid little attention because the law was rarely enforced – a situation which has now changed in Inverclyde where an increasing number of fines have now been issued. Assistant enforcement officers, usually working in pairs in case they need to give evidence, are on patrol in problem areas – such as Battery Park and Murdieston Park – but they also respond to specific complaints from residents.

One officer said, "We can be out at 7am if someone has reported a particular person walking their dog at that time and we are out on evenings and weekends too. Most people realise that they have done something wrong; they know they are not supposed to do it. Some people protest but we have instant access to police and can trace owners through car registration plates. They can be fined up to £500 for not giving their name and details."

Her colleague said, "Owners must also put the bags in suitable bins. Throwing the bag in the river, in bushes or down the drain is unacceptable. I would much rather everybody just picked it up and disposed of it properly in a bin. It's not nice to be out and see it happening or stand in it and the health implications are very serious."

There was a case of a man allowing his dog to foul bushes in a front garden every day. There were five complaints from different individuals. The householder's granddaughter had fallen in some dog dirt four years earlier and had got some in her eyes. This could have caused eye infections and on occasions it can lead to blindness. In this case, the dog-owner was caught and fined.

The enforcement crackdown has encouraged people to approach dog owners themselves and point out that they could be fined for not cleaning up after their dog.

"We are also getting more reports from members of the public," said one of the officers. "Anyone reporting a dog-owner doesn't have to give their name. We are prepared to sit and wait, even if it takes a few mornings, to catch whoever has been reported."

## Councillor Eric Forbes

Well, it's back to work and all the pain and pleasure that brings and I hope you all had an enjoyable festive time. What is on the table for Wemyss Bay in the months to come?

The main issue will be the decision regarding the situation in relation to Wemyss Bay Primary. King's Glen Primary School was placed on the table as a possible decant school and the School Board after due deliberation felt that it was the preferred option rather than St.Columba's, all things being considered. This caused some concern amongst parents as they felt that a final decision had been made. Some of the parents attended the following School Board meeting and others made representations by letter or e-mail. After the School Board meeting I held an "impromptu surgery" and this allowed those in attendance to voice their concerns. I then made the offer of supplying transport to view both King's Glen and St.Columba's and this took place on Wednesday 22 November 2006 when approx. 50 parents, grandparents and other relations took up the offer and a full bus load experienced the run to both schools and viewed the accommodation. After that event a letter was sent out by the Authority through the School to parent(s) and invited comment/observation on the options available. The responses to this will be fed into the discussion process and will be taken into account when the decision is taken at the Education Committee on Tuesday 9 January 2007. The decision reached will also have taken into account the views of the parents, the views of the Head Teacher and the staff and the Council's Officers' professional advice on all fronts. Once the decision is made then we can then get into the nitty gritty of sorting out the issues in respect of the chosen option. We all want what is best for the children during their stay at whatever location during the building period of what is virtually a new school and I am sure in the spirit of co-operation we will all work towards that end and finally moving back into a school "fit for purpose" in the 21st.century education world. Communication is essential and I will ensure this takes place.

The next item is the entering into discussions with the Council to obtain LNR status (LOCAL NATURE RESERVE) for the woodlands in Wemyss Bay. This involves contact with Scottish Natural Heritage, Legal and Ground Services of the Council. The process was initiated in 2003 and approved by the Head of Planning Services and because of the amount of work that has taken place in the woods it is now felt that the time is right to move the process along. We are now looking at addressing the issues indicated in Phase 2 of the project. The woodlands have changed character due to a lot of hard work on the part of the Association and we see the rewards of more people and children using the woods as an area of recreation and relaxation and of course of natural interest. The Association is always looking for volunteers to assist on the "working weekends" and I hope that the residents of Wemyss Bay could see their way to offering some assistance in the future workings within the woods and besides the work it is a very healthy and sociable way of getting together in the interests of the community. Finally, a short note just to say that we are still in discussions with the Insurance Company in relation to the usage of the play bond as a contribution towards the installation of the MUGA (Multi Use Generation Area) at Wemyss Bay. I shall keep everyone up to date on this one.

## **David Cairns MP: Inverclyde Royal Hospital – Saved**

2007 got off to a great start with the news that Inverclyde Royal Hospital has been saved. There were many dark times during the last few years when it looked like we would lose the IRH altogether or, at best, have it reduced to little more than a cottage hospital. But the people of Inverclyde refused to accept the decisions of the old Health Board and, by working together, we managed to see off Argyll and Clyde, and persuade its successor that IRH should retain not only its vital A & E Department, but also the vast majority of its current services. A truly wonderful result.

But none of this happened by accident. It was down to the hard work of ordinary people in Wemyss Bay and, indeed, throughout Inverclyde, who refused to accept the previous plans to reduce our hospital to little more than an outpost of the Royal Alexandra. You are the people who marched in protest through Inverclyde, signed petitions, went to meetings and just refused to let our hospital wither away. This campaign succeeded because it was a community campaign, not a political one, and it had support across the entire political spectrum.

We have managed to keep virtually all of our major services. A & E, which so many of you contacted me about, will remain open and still be able to deal with medical cases, trauma and general surgery. People suffering from abdominal pain, breathing difficulties, fractures and accidents will also continue to go to Inverclyde Royal and not face the long, difficult journey to Paisley. And inpatient services, outpatient and day-care cases have also been saved with the bulk of them remain at IRH.

The new Greater Glasgow and Clyde Health Board have shown that they are willing to listen to what local people want, and their new proposals will secure the long term future of IRH, ending many years of worry and uncertainty for us all. Existing staff can now concentrate on dealing with patients instead of wondering if they will still have a job to go to; the hospital's newfound status will attract well qualified new doctors and nurses to work there, secure in the knowledge that they will have a future at Inverclyde Royal; and, best of all, everyone in Inverclyde now knows they can continue to get the best of treatment close at hand, should they ever need it.

It's a great victory for us all and we should celebrate our success.
