An Open Letter to our Politicians – John Reid

My family and I have lived happily in Wemyss Bay for 15 years, my kids have never lived anywhere else, and we love being part of a safe and vibrant community. That said, with local, Scottish and you never know maybe national elections being held in 2007 I would like to ask Mr Forbes, Mr McNeill and Mr Cairns two simple questions:

What have you done for the community of Wemyss Bay in recent years?

What do you plan to do for the community of Wemyss Bay in the years ahead?

The reason I ask is that the only obvious change in Wemyss Bay in the last 15 - 20 years, apart from a growing sense of community spirit, has been the dramatic increase in the number of houses and the subsequent increase in population. This in itself is no bad thing but the lack of infrastructure to go with this increase has left a void in our community.

Apart from the house building any other changes in Wemyss Bay have been down to the community and I have given a few examples below

1. The Wemyss Bay Community Centre – Kept open through the hard work and dedication of the Community Association. One can only imagine what more they could do with a Community Centre fit for purpose.
2. The Gala Weekend – I understand the Council provide funding to support the Gala Weekend but again the success of this excellent event is down to those volunteers who organise it.
3. The Woodland Group – This group has done a terrific job in making the woods a focal point of the village and accessible to all. The council may provide support but without the Woodland Group there would probably be houses there now.
4. Ardgowan Football Development – I have to declare an interest here, although this is a personal letter, but here is an example of just one community group who have prospered without any proper facilities or council support

I am sure that the politicians will point to the new school as a significant contribution to Wemyss Bay and I welcome this long overdue development. I would point out though that as we have the fastest growing population in Inverclyde and it is the 21st Century then the claim of 'A larger school fit for the 21st Century' is a bit of a no brainer!

It's time for some Council, SIP (you can spend it here now you know) or other form of Government spending to be directed in the direction of Wemyss Bay. The people, especially the kids, of this community deserve the same access to community facilities and support as those in other parts of Inverclyde. Compare our Christmas tree against the lights of Gourrock, Greenock and Port Glasgow as a small example of how we are treated.

I would urge all residents of Wemyss Bay to ask our politicians, and their opponents, to answer these two questions before deciding who they give their vote to in the future.

Inverkip and Wemyss Bay Community Council – Innes Nelson

Inverkip and Wemyss Bay Community Council was once again delighted to engage the services of a clown to appear at the Christmas party at the Community Centre on Friday the 1st of December. The evening went with a bang and the children seemed to enjoy the performance of 'Freddie Whiz' judging by the sounds of laughter. The Christmas decorations added to the festive feel of the event, which was well organised by the Wemyss Bay Community Association. And the mulled wine – made, it was said, from an ancient and secret recipe – was a real hit.

The Stewart Milne planning application to build 240 houses on the green belt at Inverkip was approved by Inverclyde Council on the 6th of December. However this has received a backlash of criticism from Inverclyde Council on Disability as the new bridge proposed for Inverkip Station only has stairs, and does not comply with the Disability Discrimination Acts 1995 and 2005. The rail operator First Scotrail will now have to apply to the Department for Transport for dispensation to be allowed to build a non compliant bridge before the development can proceed. There is also the possibility local Council Taxpayers may be subsidising most of the maintenance and future replacement of the bridge.

The Police held a public meeting on Wednesday the 23rd of November in Inverkip Primary School to consult with residents on problems within our villages. The main problems identified were lack of local knowledge in new call centres, lack of response to calls, disorder, vandalism and alcohol abuse near homes. Anyone who wants to report a crime can do so on 0800 555 111 and can remain anonymous if so wished.

After considering Bute Community Council's Wind Farm Policy the Community Council recently adopted a Wind Farm Policy to clarify our position on wind farm developments. In it we state we will normally support wind farm applications if they are within areas identified by planners as appropriate for wind farm developments in Structure and Local Plans. However if an application is outwith these appropriate areas and could adversely affect our Regional Parks, our tourist industry, or endangered wildlife we will normally oppose them.

Community Council members attended an exhibition at the Wemyss Bay Hotel on the 6th of December to consider the proposed development by West Coast Energy Ltd for a 14-turbine wind farm on the top of Corlarach Hill, Innellan. From what we can see this proposal is not in an identified appropriate area of search, and will not only have an impact on our valuable tourism industry but will be visually dominant as we look at Argyll. This application is expected to be submitted early in 2007. We will keep you updated. At the moment there is another application from Community Windpower Limited at Millour Hill for six 125 metre turbines within Clyde Muirshiel Regional Park. Clyde Muirshiel is not an area identified for any wind farm development in Structure or Local Plans and Scottish Natural Heritage has just approved the park as a Special Protection Area (SPA) for Hen Harriers. Councillor Eric Forbes

Well so far 2007 has offered us a spell of rather unacceptable weather and I hope everyone has survived safely through it. Like myself I am sure there are some people who lost their television picture over the festive season and beyond due to the adverse weather bringing down the electrical power supply to the receiver. Did we miss anything?

I believe the main issue on the horizon for the village is the extension and refurbishment of the Primary School. At the Education Committee on 9 January 2007 a decision was reached to decant the school to take over Kings Glen School with the move taking place in April. When this was first mooted there were concerns expressed by several parents and as a result I organised a bus to take parents to Kings Glen and St.Columba's in order that they could experience the journeys and see the accommodation. The concerns previously expressed by several parents seemed to have been addressed as the feedback was virtually nil and this was part of the debate at the Committee. I have to thank these parents /guardians for taking the time to visit the schools and now with the decision having been made I will ensure that communication is at the forefront of any issues in relation to the move. I believe it is the right move and the children will return to a school which will have cost £3.5m to extend and refurbish and will be conducive to the needs of modern education. A further sum of money, namely £7,727 has been allocated to the school and this has been spent on classroom supplies and other needs for the school at this time. At this moment a financial commitment of circa £4.2m has been made to cover the total costs.

David Cairns MP - Change of Climate for Wemyss Bay

It is tempting to think that climate change is something that affects other parts of the world, but recent storms in January have shown just how vulnerable Inverclyde is to our changing weather. As gales battered Greenock, Tesco had to close, roads in Gourock became impassable and Caledonian MacBrayne was forced to cancel sailings from Wemyss Bay. The areas that were badly affected all had one thing in common; they were close to the sea.

Climate change is the greatest long term threat faced by humanity and two of its most serious consequences are more intense and frequent rainfall, and rising sea levels. Coastal flooding will become an increasing feature of our weather and this will cause problems for us all, but those who live close to the Clyde will be among the first to suffer. There are already people in Inverclyde who have to pay increased premiums for their house insurance because companies think that living beside the river poses an increased risk.

So as rivers rise, drainage systems fail and some coastal defences prove inadequate against the might of nature, just what can we do to combat the damage to our climate. All the experts tell us that we need to reduce greenhouse gases and stop pumping carbon dioxide into the atmosphere. Our Government was one of the first to accept climate change and our 2000 Climate Change Programme has already helped put us on track to meet our Kyoto greenhouse gas reduction commitment. Indeed, we are projected to go significantly beyond our Kyoto commitment and reduce our greenhouse gas emissions by 23-25 per cent by 2010, one of the best records of any country in the world. Of course this is a global problem and we can't do it on our own, every nation in the world must play its part and, unfortunately, some are not taking their obligations as seriously as the United Kingdom.

Faced with such a huge problem, it is easy to feel helpless. But, surprisingly, there is a lot we can do and even little changes

can make a big difference. If everyone in Wemyss Bay switched just three of the light bulbs in their house to energy saving ones, not only would family power bills fall, but we would save enough energy to run all the street lights in the village. In the UK 25 per cent of our carbon emissions come from our own homes so if we all made small changes like turning our central heating down by one degree, switching off our appliances instead of leaving them on standby and putting off lights, we could have a real impact on the environment.

The evidence that our lifestyle is changing our climate becomes more compelling by the week. So is the knowledge of the disastrous effects it will have on our lives – and more importantly the lives of our children and their grandchildren - if we don't act to reverse it. We all need to start now (politicians included) otherwise future generations may find that living close to the Clyde is no longer an option.

Duncan McNeil MSP

It's at this gloomy time of year – dark when you get up in the morning, dark before you even finish work – that I really miss the sunlight. Imagine, though, if this lack of light wasn't just something to be endured for a few months a year. Imagine if, even in summer, you hardly ever saw daylight.

Sadly, this is what too many people are forced to suffer, just because selfish neighbours have let their hedge grow to such a ludicrous height that it blocks out all but the July midday sun. And, besides from the loss of light in your home and garden, hedge disputes can be a major cause of anxiety; they can give rise to feelings of intimidation, of powerlessness and can damage property.

My colleague, Scott Barrie, is therefore putting forward a draft Bill at Holyrood which aims to end this misery by introducing an arbitration mechanism for dealing with complaints about high hedges.

At the moment, Scott is consulting on the how such a mechanism should operate. What, for example, should be classed as a "high" hedge? And what sort of complaints about them should be admissible? Who should be allowed to complain? What sort of appeals procedure should there be?

To help answer these questions, he wants to gather together as many views and experiences as possible. Not only will this ensure that the final Bill's provisions will work effectively, high quality, well-constructed proposed legislation also stands the best chance of making it onto the statute books.

So, if you are or have been affected by a neighbour's high hedge, or if you have experience of such disputes, now is your chance to shape this Bill.

There are a number of ways in which you can become involved and help with the Association's work. One of the most important and easiest is to keep your eyes & ears open and report incidents of anti-social behaviour to the police. Perhaps you would be prepared to take a plastic bag with you when you walk through the wood and collect any rubbish you find. If a few more people were to do this, then our already stretched volunteers could concentrate on other work rather than having to organise litter collection mornings as well. Maybe you would take a turn filling the bird feeders as this needs done several times a week.

You can join the Association – in addition to updates on our work you have the satisfaction of knowing that your membership money enables us to continue running and membership only costs £2 for an individual or £3 for a household for a calendar year. Although it seems like it sometimes, we do not actually live in the wood! Wemyss Bay Wood is owned by Inverclyde Council and the Woodland Association is merely a group of concerned local residents interested in protecting and preserving the area for future generations. We do not make decisions about what is or is not going to happen with the wood and at all times work within the instructions of the local authority. If you have concerns or complaints about anything regarding the wood, or indeed the wider area, these should be directed to Inverclyde Council.
