Grandparents / Parents Day – Gillian & Megan (p7)

On 23rd February it was our annual Grandparents / Parents Day in Wemyss Bay Primary School. It has always been a tradition in Wemyss Bay. Everyone enjoyed the day and hopefully when we move to our temporary school at Easter (Kings Glen) it will still take place.

The grandparents came to visit the pupils in the morning and they did lots of fun activities. They helped the pupils in Primary 7 draw a Vincent Van Gogh picture of a bedroom. Other activities included a space mobile in primary 4, making a balancing parrot in Primary 3/4, and cursive handwriting in Primary 3.

In the afternoon the parents helped Primary 7 draw a picture of Picasso's "Woman In A Chair". The parents of Primary 6 pupils helped them make props for our school show, Treasure Island, and in Primary 5 they made collages of landscapes. The activity in primary 1 was making caterpillar puppets and in Primary 2 they made giraffes from newspaper.

While enjoying a cup of tea or coffee in the hall, the Grandparents and Parents were entertained by the Scottish poetry finalists, singing games performed by the nursery, Primary 1 and Primary 2, and the winning Brownie team of Scottish country dancers. Everyone had a great day!

Book Fair – Rachel, Gillian & Sophie (p7)

On 9 and 12 March, Wemyss Bay Primary had a book fair. There were books, stationery and posters, all to be sold. It all went very well and we raised a lot of money for the school. The Primary 7 pupils were put into groups of three and they were in charge of selling the books for two days. There was a timetable for each class so that they knew when to go to the book fair. Some people forgot their money but they were able to reserve a book they liked and they were able to pay for it the next day. We raised £944.59 altogether and everyone had a great time.

Parking around the School

The Village News has been contacted by a number of people to complain that parking around the school continues to be a problem, with some parents or carers still showing little or no regard for the safety of any, but their own, children by parking on the zigzags. This is particularly noticeable during bad weather, but also following after-school activities, indeed recently one mother was spotted parked, not on the zigzags, but across the red crossing area, forcing other children to try and go round her car to cross and totally obscuring them from oncoming traffic. (Never mind the risk to all the other children, her little darling didn't get wet!)

It is illegal to park on zigzags at any time, not just during school hours, so please bear this in mind and park safely.

Obviously, the police cannot be around all the time and there is nothing that school staff can do, other than to ask people to move, however, if you and another witness are prepared to make a complaint to the police giving your name and address and the details of the car involved, they can take action.

In the lead up to the Easter holidays, the situation was not helped by work taking place to extend the Community Centre car-park. This work was essential to provide parking bays for the buses which will be used to transport the children every day to their temporary accommodation at Kings Glen.

When the schools return after Easter, please try and park responsibly and also bear in mind that, as the Community Centre car-park is the collection and dropping off point for school buses, there will be many more children in this area so please pay extra attention if parking here.

Doctor's Surgery Parking

You are reminded that parking in the surgery carpark is solely for the use of patients and staff. Again, when parents are dropping children off and picking them up from school or nursery this appears to be a problem, with people making use of the surgery carpark to save themselves a walk. This has resulted in patients being unable to park. Show some consideration: these people need to use the carpark because they are unwell, how would you feel if it were your child and you couldn't get parked?

P4 – P7 Youth Club

The p4 – p7 youth club meets every Thursday during term time from 7 – 8.30pm. There is a 50p entrance charge and a tuck shop is available during the night. With a wide variety of activities to choose from there is something to suit everyone whether you prefer football, basketball, badminton, table-tennis, rounders, arts & crafts, music, computer games, board games or some of the other activities which take place on a regular basis.

The Youth Club is run totally by volunteers without any support or funding from Inverclyde Council and, contrary to the belief of some parents, does not make a profit, in fact leaders regularly dip into their own pockets to pay for materials, treats and to cover let fees. It is, understandably, annoying when some people seem to persist in claiming that leaders are being paid for their time – as with most of our local organisations leaders give their time for no recompense. Leaders have been vetted through Disclosure Scotland.

Comic Relief at Wemyss Bay Primary

Friday 16th March was Comic Relief's Red Nose Day and pupils at Wemyss Bay Primary entered into the spirit of the event. Primary 7 pupils planned the fun day which included face-painting and lots of fun and games. In addition pupils were asked to attend school that day wearing over-sized clothes.

During the fortnight leading up to the day pupils were able to purchase red noses, including a sticker and a small chocolate, for the sum of £1.

Woodland Association Plea

It is our aim to try and complete the major part of the remaining rhododendron clearance in the terraced gardens and its approaches within the next couple of months, leaving us only a limited amount of re-growth to tackle thereafter. If you have been along at any time in the last 4 years, why not join us for a last push. If you have not helped out before but use the wood in any way, then this is your opportunity to join in and contribute to the improvement of a much used local amenity. We have a small, but dedicated, band of volunteers but it would really make a difference to our work if a few more people were to join us, even for an hour or two. As the average age of our volunteers is 55yrs (and this takes into account the couple of children) it really is amazing the amount of work we have achieved but we are running out of steam. Many people stop to say that they are pleased with the work completed to date and this is always good to hear but a couple of hours work would mean so much more. The Association will be holding working weekends on Saturday 7th & Sunday 8th and Saturday 21st & Sunday 22nd April and Saturday 5th & Sunday 6th May. We are continuing to work in the area adjoining Ardgowan Road heading up to the point at the end of Cliff Terrace Road so meet at the Ardgowan Road of Cliff Terrace Road. We work from 9.30am – 3pm and provide all the necessary gloves, safety glasses and tools. In addition we stop for coffee/tea and biscuits in the morning and provide hot sausage rolls and soup at lunchtime. We have a qualified first aider present at all times (although thankfully, so far, the worst we have had to deal with is the odd scratch, minor cut or midge bites). Children are welcome to come along (we do have gloves to fit) however they must be accompanied at all times by a responsible adult.

David Cairns MP - New climate change legislation fits the bill

To me, climate change is quite simply the most important issue facing our planet today and that's why I've returned to the subject for this month's edition of the Wemyss Bay News. Over the last few years the debate has shifted from whether we need to act to when we need to act and just how much we need to do. From my postbag, I know that this is something which interests people across the whole of Inverclyde, but I do get more enquiries about it from Wemyss Bay than almost any other part of the constituency. Whether this is prompted by living in close proximity to the sea, or by the fact that there are many parents with young families in the village who are clearly concerned about the kind of world their children will inherit, I don't know. But it is something which is obviously worrying you, which is why I decided to use this month's column to outline the UK Government plans to tackle this in its Climate Change Bill.

We will be the first country in the world to adopt a long-term legal framework for managing our transition to a low carbon economy. We will set challenging targets to reduce our carbon dioxide emissions by 26%-32% by 2020 and by at least 60% by 2060, using 1990 as our baseline. And what's more, we will make these targets legally binding. As we have seen from past experience good intentions alone are not enough, you need to have a very tight monitoring and reporting system to make something like this succeed.

So how will it work in practice? Just how are we going to deliver this? Well, we know it won't be easy, and that's why we are setting up a new body to provide the Government with independent expert advice and guidance on achieving its targets and staying within its carbon budget. It will be called the Committee on Climate Change.

We will introduce a new system of legally binding five year "carbon budgets", set at least 15 years ahead, to provide clarity on the UK's pathway towards its key targets and increase the certainty that businesses and individuals need to invest in low-carbon technologies. And we will have a system of annual reporting to Parliament so we know how well we are doing. The Committee on Climate Change will provide a progress report to which the Government must respond and, ultimately, if it fails, the Government can be taken to court.

These are tough measures but I think that we need them, otherwise we will destroy our world, and those living closest to the sea in villages like Wemyss Bay will be among the first to suffer. But everyone needs to play their part and even little changes can make a big difference. Could you cut out even one car journey a week; I know I could. And next time you buy an electrical appliance why not make sure it carries the energy saving logo; and don't forget that home insulation, you can cut your energy bills and help save the planet all at the same time.

The frightening thing is we don't have much time. Some scientists predict that if we don't stop adding carbon dioxide to our atmosphere within the next ten years, it will be too late and the climate will be irreversibly damaged. We have to make the Climate Change Bill work – for the sake of our all our children's futures.

Councillor Forbes

By now most houses will have had their Council Tax notification through the door and it is good news. Inverclyde Council for the first time in its history has managed to cut Council Tax and freeze Council rents. The Council Tax is being cut by 0.65% and while this might not seem much it is set against a background of Council Tax increases across the rest of Scotland averaging 1.9% and inflation running at 2.7%. Also the cut has been made without raiding the reserves, without cuts in Council services or compulsory redundancies. Considering the fact that the Council inherited "the famous black-hole" in finances in 2003 it is down to prudent financial management, making right decisions and hard work that has now brought about a financial stability from which the residents of Inverclyde can now start to benefit. Further areas of investment in the budget were: £1million of capital monies will be spent on roads and this has been a continual investment over the past three years in an effort to redress the balance of non-investment over a number of years prior to that; £400,000 to continue our cleaner and greener programme; £1.5m for a Community Investment Fund the main thrust of which is to improve leisure/community facilities throughout Inverclyde and a share of this will go to upgrading Wemyss Bay Community Centre. The largest single section of the budget will be £33million capital spending on schools over the next two years. There are many other areas of investment such as £1million committed to Riverside Inverclyde, our Urban Regeneration Company, to continue its programme of regeneration including the waterfront which everyone can see is being transformed. A £600,000 Efficiency Fund set up to make the Council run more efficiently and improve performance. A commitment was made to get the finances of this Council back to a sound footing and this has been done. There will be challenges in the years to come but if you start off with a good base then these can be

addressed. It is dangerous to make future financial commitments as to levels of charges but easier to tackle if the finances are right.

Wemyss Bay school is about to start and there is a lot of work going on around the school to facilitate the decant and give better lighting there, something for which I have lobbied. The extension to the car park will allow more parking there and better lighting will add some security to the hall. A Newsletter has been produced with up to date information about the decant, build etc., and it has been distributed through "schoolbags" to parents. I said I would ensure that communication would be maintained and this will be done. There will be a "dry run" prior to the actual decant so that we all can experience the journey. There will be a leaflet circulated regarding parking around the school during the decant and I would ask parents to help by agreeing to not parking inappropriately. I will continue to ensure that communication is continued and an "open day" will be arranged when the school moves to King's Glen. There is a lot of work on-going at King's Glen at this moment in time.

A problem that is not going away is the depositing of dog's dirt on footpaths and other places. I have now been successful in getting the dog wardens to cover the village and they have in fact visited. It is an expensive walk with the dog if the person in charge falls foul of the Officers. Please be considerate and don't have the Wardens on "your tail."

As everybody is aware there is an election on 3 May 2007 and even although I will be a participant I feel it is essential to remind eligible voters to take the time to cast their votes. It is a different method of selecting Councillors this time and a small leaflet from VoteScotland accompanying the Council Tax notices explains the system. The deadline for a postal vote application is 18 April 2007. Please use your vote.

Inverkip and Wemyss Bay Community Council

On the 6th of March Chairman Innes Nelson and Gerry Langham of Skelmorlie Community Council attended a site meeting at Wemyss Bay station with John Yellowlees, external relations manager at First Scotrail and Station Team Manager Alf Cashmore. Firstly the need to attend to the poor condition of the station frontage was noted. John told us the provision of 24-hour online CCTV is fairly imminent, and Transport Scotland is also funding an extension of the station car park on land owned by Network Rail later this year.

We spoke about Adopt a Station opportunities for the community to help to restore a floral presence by committing to the weeding and watering of tubs or planters (which may be easier to maintain safely than hanging baskets).

The future of the ticket rooms vacated by Caledonian MacBrayne was also raised, and John referred to another aspect of our Adopt a Station policy which is to find community or start-up business use for surplus accommodation which would otherwise stand empty. We hope to hold a joint community meeting with Skelmorlie Community Council in the near future to discuss all the proposals further, and it would be great if we could bring a team of volunteers together to help enhance this wonderful old building.

We have also been informed that given the importance of this listed building the Railway Heritage Trust is prepared to offer a grant towards the cost of restoration/repair and reordering works to help regenerate the building.

Most of you will by now have noticed the trees being felled behind Bridgend Cottages in Inverkip. Macintosh Homes Limited of Skelmorlie has had a planning application approved to build 28 houses and flats at the rear of the Cottages. The Community Council had objected to the planning application as it encroached into the greenbelt, but Inverclyde planners recommended it be approved. The higher section of the wood is to be replaced with hardwoods, so it is hoped the look of the area will improve in the future.

WEA, Skelmorlie and Wemyss Bay Branch – Jenny McGee

The first of our twice-yearly outings will take place on WEDNESDAY 9th MAY when we are going by coach to Edinburgh to visit Lauriston Castle followed by Rosslyn Chapel near Penicuik.

Lauriston Castle is a fine example of a grand Edwardian house left very much as when it was given in Trust to the Nation in 1926. Its interior is therefore very much redolent of the leisured and wealthy middle class way of life typical of the years before the Great War. The original tower house, dating back to the 1590's was built for Sir Archibald Napier father of the famous mathematician and inventor of Logarithms, John Napier. It lies within large landscaped gardens which includes the Edinburgh/Kyoto Friendship Garden, one of the largest Japanese gardens created in the UK over the past 100 years. Well, it's finally started. After months of shadow boxing, the election campaign has begun in earnest.

You can now look forward to several weeks of your tea being interrupted by canvassers knocking over your garden gnomes as they try to stuff the whole street's leaflets through your letterbox or loudspeaker vans outside your window.

As well as the various candidates (and although I'm writing this as your MSP, I will merely be one of the candidates for the Greenock and Inverclyde constituency by the time you read it) making promises about what they would do in return for your vote, they also want to trumpet their record – either in office or opposition.

Looking back over my last four years, one highlight is definitely the ban on smoking in public places. If someone had told you back in 2003 that, by the time of the next Scottish Parliament elections, all our pubs, cafes and restaurants would be smoke-free, would you have believed them?

I was certainly surprised by how smoothly what was a pretty fundamental culture shift went: there were no riots in the streets and the new laws are, on the whole, being observed.

No surprise, though, is the news that workers in the hospitality industry are already enjoying healthier working environments. Bar and waiting staff shouldn't be exempt from the workplace protection everyone else takes for granted – a fact which overcame my original scepticism about the ban.

That being said, the new smoke-free laws have to be just one weapon in our fight against poor public health in places like Inverclyde. We also need to do more to reduce the number of people who smoke. That means high quality, accessible smoking

cessation services and, as evidence from elsewhere shows, stopping the next generation picking up the suicidal habit by raising the minimum purchasing age for tobacco from 16 to 18.

And, now that the future of the IRH is settled, the key challenge for the NHS must be shifting its focus from simply fixing us when we fall ill, to helping us lead longer and healthier lives – stopping us developing the serious, chronic conditions which blight and curtail too many lives in our part of the world.
