Gala Weekend: Friday 15th – Sunday 17th June

This year the annual Gala Weekend will take place from Friday 15th – Sunday 17th June.

This year, for the first time, we are holding a disco on the Friday night with a "Beach Party" theme. With a popular DJ and a buffet, the evening is sure to be popular. The marquee will be decorated with a beach theme and we ask that everyone enter into the spirit of the evening and dress appropriately so dust off your shades and look out your shorts! Just remember to use plenty of insect repellent! Tickets go on sale on Monday 4th June at the Community Centre Box Office from 6.30 – 7.30pm and will be available at the same time every evening thereafter until they are sold out. Last year, we ran out of tickets within three days so make sure you get yours as soon as they go on sale or you will miss out on what is guaranteed to be a night to remember.

The events on Saturday start at 12 noon when this year's Gala Queen, accompanied by her attendants, will officially open the Gala. All the stalls will be run by local organisations or businesses and will include the Brownies, Guides, PTA, Mums & Tots and Woodland Association. Once again the youth clubs will be running the tuck shop and the hot dog & burger stall – last year they were sold out by 3.00pm so, although Liz has ordered even more for this year, you will still have to be quick. Ardgowan Football Development will be repeating their popular pie and Bovril stand. The Community Centre will be given over to the Guides tearoom – always a popular attraction with all the lovely home-baking. The Bible Club will again run the Beat the Goalie competition and Stephen hopes that he will not be covered in quite so much mud this year.

Gala Day would not be complete without all the rides for the young and young at heart. This year they will be even bigger and better than before. The Animal Man will be back again this year, bringing with him a selection of animals for the children to see and handle, including rabbits, guinea pigs, snakes and tarantulas! There will still be the Bouncy Castle, Children's Carousel and the Junior Inflatable Slide for the younger visitors. In addition there will be some aimed at older children, teenagers and adults. Laser Quest is back again this year at popular request along with the Giant Inflatable Obstacle Course and Giant Slide. There will also be displays from the Coastguard and Police and the Fire Brigade will be along with a tender, which is always popular with the little ones.

During Saturday afternoon, Ardgowan Football Development will take on Boca Bay Juniors in what has become a much coveted annual challenge. While we do not encourage gambling, there is a good chance of a couple of pennies changing hands.

This year once again, the beer-tent will be providing a wide range of alcoholic and non-alcoholic drinks. Spirits, wine, canned and bottled drinks will appear side by side with "Helga's Big Jugs" from Houston Brewery.

For the first time ever, Gala Day will wind up at 8pm, however there will not be an earlier break and entertainment will continue through to the end, with last orders at 7.30pm. Obviously, therefore, there will be no need for tickets for Saturday evening, although there is a limit on numbers in the marquee so, unless you secure a place earlier in the day, you will not get in. With an early close on Saturday night, there is bound to be more demand for Friday night tickets, so make sure that you don't miss out. Ardgowan Football Development will host their Annual Open Day on Sunday 18th June at the Community Centre and Playing Field from 11.15am – 3.00pm. There will be displays of training sessions and games. Ardgowan Thistle Football Club will take on local guest teams. There will also be the annual presentation of certificates and trophies. This is a must for all parents, families and friends of youngsters attending AFD.

Each year, the Community Association has to gamble on the success of the Gala. Even if there is a poor turnout the marquees, bands, rides, beer etc. still have to be paid for. Over the years there have been many generous sponsors who help fund specific items or donate prizes to the raffles. Sponsors are still required for this year's event – would your business be prepared to help or can you provide a raffle prize?

Last year was the best Gala yet. A little luck with the weather and your support over the weekend could change that and ensure that this year breaks all the records!!

Chernobyl Children Lifeline – Glasgow Link – Sarah Gregory

I wonder if you remember the Chernobyl disaster? On 26th April 1986 a reactor at the Chernobyl Nuclear Plant in the Ukraine exploded. Belarus was the worst hit region. The people of Chernobyl were exposed to radioactivity 90 times greater than the Hiroshima bomb. It is estimated that it will take up to 400 hundred years to rid Belarus of contamination.

In 1992 the Chernobyl Children Life Line charity was founded, the purpose being to help the children of Belarus. It is made up of over 130 Link groups around the UK. The aim of these Links is to raise money in order to bring groups of children to their particular areas for respite care. It is estimated that a month in the UK eating uncontaminated food and breathing uncontaminated air boosts their immune systems to such an extent that it adds an extra two years on to their life expectancy.

The Glasgow Link covers out as far as the Inverclyde area and this summer is bringing over a group of 10 children for one months respite care. The Link is actively raising funds to meet the costs of this visit and future visits. To help boost these funds 8 year old Katrina and her mum, Sarah, have organised a sponsored walk on Sunday 20th May around the Greenock Cut.

No New Houses at Bridgend

A number of people have contacted us to ask about the clearance of the woodland behind the cottages at Bridgend. The landowners, Ardgowan Estates operate a commercial forestry business complete with the Bankfoot Sawmill. The trees in the area which has been cleared were planted around 30 years ago and have now reached the height and age for harvesting. This work has been carried out following discussions and approvals from the Forestry Commission.

There is no suggestion that there is any intention to use the land for anything other than further forestry planting so, in a few years time, the area will once again be covered in woodland.

It is worth mentioning that Bankfoot Sawmill is an excellent source of competitively priced timber and the Woodland Association would like to thank them for donating wood and providing more at cost price for all the bird boxes which were constructed last year.

Skelmorlie and Wemyss Bay Parish Church – Rev W Armstrong

Over the past few weeks, politicians have been pandering to our prejudices and baser instincts, each promising paradise as a better bargain than their opponents – you may have noticed that Parliamentary and Local Authority elections are only days away. David Cairns MP: Mum's the word as new employments rights kick in

Last year over 800 women in Inverclyde gave birth to babies, including many new mums living in Wemyss Bay. Most of the mums were in work when they became pregnant, and many of them will have wanted to return to work after the birth of their baby. Women are an important part of the workforce and the Government knows that, if we are to ensure that businesses thrive and industry gets the best people for the job, we need to make it as easy as possible for mums to go back to work after they've given birth. But mothers need time to bond with their babies, and not everyone is well enough to return to work a few short months after their baby is born, so in April of this year the Government extended paid maternity leave for new mums to 9 months.

It is not the job of politicians to tell people how to live their lives and it is up to each individual mum to decide if they want to return to work after they give birth. However, it is our job to give them more choices and support so they can take a decision that is right for them and their baby. And this is exactly what we have done over the last decade by steadily increasing maternity leave and maternity pay and by giving increased rights, not just to working mums, but to dads too.

In the last ten years we have doubled maternity pay from £55 per week to £106 per week and we have tripled maternity leave from 14 weeks to 9 months. And the good news is, that within the next few years paid maternity leave will be increased again and mothers to be will be entitled to a full year's maternity pay. All this means that women have far more choice than ever before and an increasing number of them are opting to return to work when their babies are older. It's important to try and balance the rights of workers with the needs of business, and I think that over the course of the last 10 years we have been successful in extending the rights of all employees, without damaging Britain's competitiveness in the wider world.

Helping mums back to work is about more than just increased maternity leave and better maternity pay. Many mothers want to return to work part time and this is why we introduced the right to request flexible working for parents with children under the age of 6. This has proved very popular with mothers returning to work, as it gives them an opportunity to keep their skills up-to-date, while, at the same time, giving them the chance to spend time with their children. Most employers in Inverclyde seem to be responding well to this, as they recognise that it is in their interests to hold onto experienced, reliable workers, rather than have to go to all the effort and expense of recruiting a new, untried member of staff.

But sometimes things can go wrong when women are returning from maternity leave. Any mum who thinks that her employers are not complying with the law can get advice from her union or, if she is not a union member, she can contact Inverclyde Employment Rights on 888039 for free, confidential information. Women have certainly come along way in the workplace in the last 10 years and, with increased employment rights and protection from discrimination, they will certainly go a lot further.
