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Back to School

For some, first day at school can be a traumatic time with tears and tantrums, while others have been looking forward to it for months (and that is just the parents!). Didn't all the new primary 1s look great as they headed off to school in their uniforms? At this time of year, with all the little ones starting out, it is appropriate to remind everyone of the potential dangers of parking around the school and the community centre, particularly this year with the buses coming and going to decant the children up to King's Glen. Did you know that it is now recognised by experts that a child's road sense is not fully developed until the age of 11 – most of the time they are perfectly safe but occasionally, when distracted, or if they see someone they wish to speak to on the other side of the road, they just run out.

During recent years, several children have been knocked down around the school. Let's all work together to try and prevent a tragedy happening this year. Do not park on the zigzags – not only is it dangerous but it is also illegal, even though the school is not being used at present. The car-park at the shops is always particularly busy during drop-off and pick-up times. Please take particular care here and watch out for children running across the car-park, especially when reversing as many of the P1s and 2s are too little to be seen through your rear-view mirror. Do not park in the surgery car-park. It is reserved for patients and staff and it is essential that patients can get parked here quickly in the event of an emergency and similarly that the doctors can get out quickly if necessary. People often park right up to the corners of Lomond Road, Brueacre Road and the roads leading out on to them, in addition to along both sides of Ardgowan Road. This restricts the view of drivers trying to turn and is both dangerous and contrary to the Highway Code, which could result in the police taking action. Finally, please show consideration for those living in the immediate surroundings of the school and community centre and do not park across their driveways – how would you feel if they came along to your home and blocked you in? If we all show some common sense we can ensure the safety of all the children on the roads around the school.

Last Village News?

After 6 years on the Community Association Committee, and 4 years as editor of the Village News, I have decided to resign and this is my last edition. So far, no-one has come forward to take over and therefore this could be the last edition. The Village News started in September 1987 and since then has grown from a single A4 sheet to its current size.

Duncan McNeil MSP: Raise the Bar to Justice

Apart from the fact that they are expensive and slow, the only thing you can guarantee about court proceedings is that there are no guarantees.

But what if someone owes you money, or has sold you faulty goods, or has damaged your property and they refuse to honour their obligations? Is the only solution to embark on a full blown court case?

Not necessarily. The Sheriff Court has special procedures designed for handling smaller claims like these. Known as a Small Claims Court, the idea is that the system is quick, cheap and does not require you to engage a solicitor.

The problem, though, is that, in defining what qualifies as a "small claim" which can be dealt with under these stripped-down procedures, an upper limit on the value of the claim has to be set. Sadly, this upper limit is only £750 in Scotland. In England and Wales, it's £5000.

So, if you want to pursue a loss in excess of £750, you have no choice but to go down the expensive, lengthy and uncertain road of hiring a lawyer. And the inability to do so, for financial or other reasons, is denying justice to many individuals with perfectly valid claims.

£750 is an unrealistically low limit today. It's a cowboys' charter, allowing the fly-by-night merchants to dodge their responsibilities. Claims for, say, damage to a vehicle done by a negligent motor mechanic could easily run into thousands of pounds. This is exactly the sort of case the Small Claims Court was designed to handle, but, as things stand, it couldn't.

Accordingly, I made representations to the Justice Minister, calling for the limit in Scotland to be brought into line with the ceiling south of the border. And, thankfully, the Minister has accepted that there is a need for the limit to be "updated to a sensible level which serves the needs of users of the court system".

I am glad that the Minister acknowledges that this limit needs to be re-visited. It is far too low to allow the Small Claims Court do the job for which it was intended and it is denying justice to decent people who have been wronged.
